from our Pastor*

As we embark upon a New Year, a large number of us adopt a New Year's Resolution (or at least we do for a day-or-two). As I look

forward to 2021, I found an article that Joe Paprocki wrote for Loyola Press to be both insightful as well as helpful, and thought I'd share it with you. (<http://joep.shoj.cc>)

New Year's resolutions are much maligned nowadays. Some people feel that they're a waste of time. I think it's admirable that people want to accomplish something positive, turn over a new leaf, and become a better version of themselves. So why do so many New Year's resolutions fail?

I can only speak for myself. My resolutions often fail for two reasons: I think I can do it on my own and I think it can be "once and done" instead of ongoing. As for thinking that I can accomplish my resolutions on my own, I tend to forget one tiny little detail: I can do nothing without God! In her book, *Simple Acts of Moving Forward: A Little Book About Getting Unstuck*, Vinita Hampton Wright reminds us that "Sooner or later God figures in." Personally, I prefer sooner rather than later. Ultimately, that's why I go to Mass on Sunday and receive the Eucharist – it's my way of admitting repeatedly that, at my deepest level, I am incapable of sustaining myself: "but only say the word and my soul shall be healed." People in twelve-step programs know this well: change can only come with reliance on a higher power.

As for thinking that this can be "once and done," I too often forget that Jesus said, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me." (Luke 9:23) Not "take up his cross once" or "take up his cross for a little while" but "take up his cross daily." At first that may sound like a downer, but when we realize that following Jesus doesn't end with the cross but with Resurrection and new life, we can find the patience, endurance, and determination to remain committed to our goals even in the face of hardship.

And so, have a happy new year. And with the help of God's grace, may we resolve each day of the new year to become the people God knows we can be.

*A note
from our Pastor*

Today the Church celebrates the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord. This brings to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our

Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

In the Eastern Church this feast is called Theophany because at the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was a sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves," He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world."

Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism are symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid actual sin.

from our Pastor*

Last month a few people caught me on their way into church to tell me they hadn't received their Sunday envelopes; this month,

a LOT of people have been telling me this.

If you've watched the local news over the last 2 months, you've undoubtedly seen reports about the enormous backlog of mail at various postal sorting locations. And, because our weekly donation envelope packets are mailed out at as *third-class, bulk-rate, mail* ... they receive low-priority when it comes to sorting and delivery.

While we may be at the mercy of the post office in the delivery of collection envelopes, **there is an option available to you that takes the postal delays out of the equation: Electronic Giving!**

For several years now, St. Patrick Parish has been partnered with *myEoffering*. This service will provide you with the convenience of donating without the need to write a check, pay postage, or scrounge for cash. Online giving is a process much like online bill pay, whereby parishioners and other donors opt to have their financial contributions to our parish withdrawn directly from their checking, or savings account, in lieu of bringing cash, or paper checks, or envelopes each Sunday.

Many people are worried about the security of their financial data, especially with the headlines concerning identity theft. Rest assured that we chose *myEoffering* in part because of their strict security measures. They have passed all the required tests to be fully compliant with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standards. This means that they are using the latest technologies available to protect against would-be data thieves. They have processed electronic donations for many churches in the United States and we feel comfortable in the security their service provides.

myEoffering has designed a secure, web-based platform in which donors may privately and prayerfully make one-time or recurring donations. Prayerful consideration of giving to God first enables you to witness a powerful sense of stewardship. You can customize a completely individual method of giving, based on how and when you receive your income – whether it be bi-weekly, monthly, or semi-monthly. By setting up recurring donations to be automatically debited from your account, it allows the parish to better plan budgets and expenditures, and provides a more accurate financial forecast. It also enables you to stay on the path of your contribution goals by ensuring that even if you are unable to attend church on a particular Sunday, you needn't worry about remembering to make that

contribution the following week. With more consistent stewardship, our parish is able to focus more on the ministry of God.

Signing up for *myEoffering* is as **simple** as clicking on the "Donate Now" button that may be found on our parish website or by going to <http://donate.StPatrick.cc>



The first time at that site, you will go to the REGISTER tab on the far right and follow the prompts; within minutes you will be prepared for giving your first online donation. On future visits to the site, you'll simply login rather than registering.

With so much happening over the last 2 months, one thing that seems to have been caught in the midst of everything was Pope

Francis' 8 December 2020 announcement of a year dedicated to St. Joseph. The year began on 8 December 2020, and concludes on 8 December 2021, according to a decree authorized by the pope.

Pope Francis has established this Year of St. Joseph so that "every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will." The decree establishing this year indicates that the pope has granted special indulgences to mark the year. In addition to the decree, Francis issued an apostolic letter 8 December 2020 dedicated to the foster father of Jesus.

Throughout the year we are encouraged to honor St. Joseph as the guardian and protector of the Church and her faithful with heartfelt prayer and devotion, encouraging all to take his virtuous life as our model for fulfilling our personal vocation to holiness.

*A note
from our Pastor*

What is known about the life of St. Blaise derives from various traditions. His feast day is celebrated in the East on Feb. 11 and in

the West on Feb. 3. All sources agree that St. Blaise was the Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia who suffered martyrdom under Licinius about AD 316. (Remember that Emperor Constantine had legalized the practice of Christianity in 313, but Licinius, his ally and co-emperor who had concurred in legalizing Christianity, betrayed him and began persecuting the Church. Constantine defeated Licinius in 324). From here, we rely on the tradition which has been associated with our liturgical celebrations over the centuries, which does not necessarily preempt their veracity or accuracy.

In accord with various traditions, St. Blaise was born to rich and noble parents, and received a Christian education. He was a physician before being consecrated a bishop at a young age. Although such a statement seems terse, keep in mind that at that time the local community usually nominated a man to be a bishop based on his outstanding holiness and leadership qualities; he in turn was then examined and consecrated by other bishops with the approval of the Holy Father. Therefore, St. Blaise must have been a great witness of our Faith, to say the least.

During the persecution of Licinius, St. Blaise, receiving some divine command, moved from the town, and lived as a hermit in a cave. Wild animals visited, and he healed any that were sick and wounded. One day, a group of hunters gathering wild beasts for the games in the amphitheater discovered St. Blaise and seized him. As he was being taken to the governor Agricolaus, the governor of Cappadocia and Lesser Armenia, St. Blaise encountered a woman whose pig was being seized by a wolf; St. Blaise commanded the wolf to release the pig, and it was freed unhurt.

While in prison, he miraculously cured a small boy who was choking to death on a fishbone lodged in his throat. Also, the woman whose pig had been saved brought St. Blaise candles so that his cell would have light and he could read the sacred Scriptures.

While we invoke St. Blaise for his protection against any physical ailment of the throat, we should also ask is protection against any spiritual ailment — profanity, cursing, unkind remarks, detraction or gossip. St. James reminds us, "If a

man who does not control his tongue imagines that he is devout, he is self-deceived; his worship is pointless" (1:26) and later, "We use [the tongue] to say, 'Praised be the Lord and Father'; then we use it to curse men, though they are made in the likeness of God. Blessing and curse come out of the same mouth. This ought not to be, my brothers!" (3:9-10). Therefore, may St. Blaise protect us from all evil, physical and spiritual, which may attack the throat.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This past week in our country we celebrated Catholic Schools Week. I celebrated a Mass at the Cathedral that was virtually watched in all our Catholic Elementary Schools. It was a great joy for me. In that same joy, I wanted to share some exciting news! Since coming to the Diocese of Cleveland this past fall, I have come to see that one of our great treasures is our Catholic School System. We are blessed with 87 Elementary Schools and 20 High Schools as well as a number of preschools, childcare centers, colleges and universities. We educate over 37,000 children in our K through 12 schools. Without a doubt, this is a very important youth ministry of our diocese.

Aware of shifting demographics, enrollment challenges, and a desire for a renewed vision for Catholic education here, a yearlong "Think Tank" was convened under the leadership of my predecessor, now Archbishop Nelson Perez. This Think Tank emphasized the need for a plan for Catholic schools in the Diocese as well as the need to address several areas of concern, ranging from governance and finance to efforts to offer high quality and vibrant Catholic schools accessible to all.

With the transfer of Archbishop Perez and the limitations caused by the pandemic, strategic planning was put on hold. Over the last few months I have met with various stakeholders around the Diocese as well as many priests and other leaders. They have encouraged me to restart this strategic planning process as soon as possible. I am now able to move this forward.

I am very excited to announce the Keeping the Faith: The Future of Catholic Schools Initiative in our Diocese. This initiative is a major undertaking in our Diocese, and I have assembled a task force to lead us through this process and present me with a strategic plan for our Catholic Elementary Schools by May 2022. After reviewing the plan with additional consultation, I hope to begin to implement this plan in the 2022 - 2023 school year.

The Task Force is charged with creating a plan with objectives, strategies, and tactics to keep our schools grounded in the Catholic faith, academically excellent, and as widely available and affordable as possible within our Diocese. The hope is that this plan will serve as a model that can be used to strengthen our Catholic high school system and guide our Parish Schools of Religion, Youth Ministry and Adult Faith Formation programs.

The Task Force includes just over 50 members to assist in this work. These members represent clergy, school staff, diocesan staff, and members of the business community and experts in education.

This initiative is not about closing schools, merging them, or suggesting major reconfiguration throughout the Diocese. While some of this may come naturally as part of the process, I believe that we can create something that allows Catholic schools to be viable, accessible, and vibrant for those who want them to be the best option for their children's education and Christian formation.

The Task Force will use the guiding principles of Strong Mission, Multiple Models, Subsidiarity, Parish and Diocesan Support, Parental Choice, and Innovation in creating this plan. The Task Force will look specifically at

and make recommendations to strengthen six areas of Catholic Schools: Quality & Catholicity, Leadership, Data Systems, Finances, Governance and Marketing and Communications. Finally, we will work to create an atmosphere within the Diocese of Cleveland that emphasizes the relationship of our Catholic schools to each other rather than one that encourages an unhealthy competition among them. The education and Christian formation of our youth is the responsibility of all of us, and this must also include our common support of our Catholic schools.

Considering this treasured heritage and shifting context, I, and leaders of Catholic schools in the Diocese believe it is the right time to reflect deeply and creatively on the vision, strategy, and operational norms of Catholic schools in the Diocese of Cleveland, to deepen and renew the commitment to our mission, and to chart a course for the future of Catholic schools in the Diocese of Cleveland. We look forward to sharing with you in the coming months and years our plans to Keep the Faith with a secure and strong Future for our Catholic Schools.

May God bless the children in our care, their families, all those who serve the educational mission of our Church, you, and those you love.

As an FYI about the distribution of ashes this year, the Vatican Congregation for Divine Worship and the Sacraments asked priests to take special anti-COVID-19 precautions this year when distributing ashes on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17, including sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads rather than using them to make a cross on people's foreheads.

Sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads, rather than marking foreheads with ashes, is the customary practice at the Vatican and in Italy. Given the spread of the coronavirus, the practice has the advantage of not requiring the priest to touch multiple people.

from our Pastor*

Bishop David L. Ricken of Green Bay, Wisconsin, former chairman of the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis, offers "10 Things to Remember for Lent":

1. Remember the formula. The Church does a good job capturing certain truths with easy-to-remember lists and formulas: 10 Commandments, 7 sacraments, 3 persons in the Trinity. For Lent, the Church gives us almost a slogan—Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving—as the three things we need to work on during the season.
2. It's a time of prayer. Lent is essentially an act of prayer spread out over 40 days. As we pray, we go on a journey, one that hopefully brings us closer to Christ and leaves us changed by the encounter with him.
3. It's a time to fast. With the fasts of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, meatless Fridays, and our personal disciplines interspersed, Lent is the only time many Catholics these days actually fast. And maybe that's why it gets all the attention. "What are you giving up for Lent? Hotdogs? Beer? Jelly beans?" It's almost a game for some of us, but fasting is actually a form of penance, which helps us turn away from sin and toward Christ.
4. It's a time to work on discipline. The 40 days of Lent are also a good, set time to work on personal discipline in general. Instead of giving something up, it can be doing something positive. "I'm going to exercise more. I'm going to pray more. I'm going to be nicer to my family, friends and coworkers."
5. It's about dying to yourself. The more serious side of Lenten discipline is that it's about more than self-control – it's about finding aspects of yourself that are less than Christ-like and letting them die. The suffering and death of Christ are foremost on our minds during Lent, and we join in these mysteries by suffering, dying with Christ and being resurrected in a purified form.
6. Don't do too much. It's tempting to make Lent some ambitious period of personal reinvention, but it's best to keep it simple and focused. There's a reason the Church works on these mysteries year after year. We spend our entire lives growing closer to God. Don't try to cram it all in one Lent. That's a recipe for failure.
7. Lent reminds us of our weakness. Of course, even when we set simple goals for ourselves during Lent, we still have trouble keeping them. When we fast, we realize we're all just one meal away from hunger. In both cases, Lent shows us our weakness. This can be painful, but recognizing how helpless we are makes us seek God's help with renewed urgency and sincerity.
8. Be patient with yourself. When we're confronted with our own weakness during Lent, the temptation is to get angry and frustrated. "What a bad person I am!" But that's the wrong lesson. God is calling us to

9. Reach out in charity. As we experience weakness and suffering during Lent, we should be renewed in our compassion for those who are hungry, suffering or otherwise in need. The third part of the Lenten formula is almsgiving. It's about more than throwing a few extra dollars in the collection plate; it's about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God's unconditional love.
10. Learn to love like Christ. Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial brings us closer to loving like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the cross for all of us. Lent is a journey through the desert to the foot of the cross on Good Friday, as we seek him out, ask his help, join in his suffering, and learn to love like him.



*A note
from our Pastor*

As you may recall, in 2010 the Diocese of Cleveland launched the *Rooted In Faith—Forward In Hope (RIF-FIH)* capital campaign through which they sought to raise endowment funds for the ongoing needs of our diocese. One on-going initiative which is funded by *RIF-FIH*, is the *Strengthening Our Faith grant program*; funds available through this grant program this year totaled \$315,839.

In November 2020, I presented the Diocese of Cleveland with a grant request *Strengthening Our Faith* grant funds under the title: *Closing-the-gap: Connecting with the socially distanced*. Two weeks ago, St. Patrick Parish received a check for \$14,000 to help subsidize our efforts at “closing the gap;” this will fund approximately 60% of that which was outlined in the grant request.


Two of the endeavors for which grant funds were requested are the:

- Distribution of our supply of 2021 Breaking Bread hymnals to parishioners, so you might better participate in the many online Masses available during the pandemic, and;
- Acquisition and installation of video and computer equipment so that St. Patrick Parish can live-stream the Mass (and other prayer experiences, such as Stations of the Cross); at present, our technology is incompatible with live-streaming.
- Obtaining tables for the Church Hall that can be more readily sanitized than the Formica-topped tables we currently have.

It will still be a while before Masses from St. Patrick Parish can be live-streamed as we need to work at creating an infrastructure (eg. a lot of hard-wiring is required). Until we're sufficiently upgraded and able to go live-stream, the weekend Mass that's recorded at Sacred Heart continues to be uploaded to YouTube for on-demand viewing and participation. The link to Mass at St Patrick (both the present on-demand Mass from Sacred Heart, as well as the future live-stream feed from St. Patrick) can be found at <http://virtual.StPatrick.cc>

*A note
from our Pastor*

Four special ceremonies commemorate the events of Christ's Passion from His entrance into Jerusalem, when palm branches were placed in His path, through His arrest on Holy Thursday and Crucifixion on Good Friday, to Holy Saturday, the day that Christ's body lay in the tomb.

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum are:

- Mass of the Lord's Supper
- Good Friday of the Lord's Passion
- Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord

On Good Friday and Holy Saturday, noticeable changes take place in the way churches are decorated. Many churches, especially in Europe, statues and cross are covered in purple or black cloth, or simply remove the decor. Holy water is removed from the church on Holy Saturday and church bells remain silent until the Gloria at Easter Vigil.



What should you do with palms from years-past?

Blessed palms should NOT be discarded as refuse, but, rather, they should be disposed of reverently. Reverent disposal could be as simple as burning the palms in a fireplace – or burying them in your garden as you prepare the soil for spring planting.

from our Pastor*

HAPPY EASTER TO ALL: The refrain from the Psalm response for Easter Day proclaims: *"This is the Day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad."* We rejoice for

Christ is risen! Alleluia! The great joy of the Easter Triduum, culminating in the Great Easter Vigil, now spills over into 50 days of celebrating. This time we call Easter or Pentecost (meaning fiftieth). For 50 days (seven times seven days plus one), we rejoice that the resurrection of Jesus has made all things new. Despite the sorrows of the human heart, despite the tragedies of the human condition, despite even the death and sickness that has overwhelmed our broken world with the coronavirus, JESUS IS THE RISEN ONE WHO IS VICTORIOUS OVER SIN AND DEATH.

The celebration of our 50 days of Easter will remain subdued this year (though not as subdued as last year), but we so sorely need the 50 days of Easter to celebrate Jesus' resurrection and its significance for our lives. Early Christians discovered that one whole week was not enough time to celebrate their joy and the mystery of the Resurrection! The *"early Christians called Eastertime the 'Sunday of the year' since fifty days is one-seventh of the whole year. For all fifty days, they prayed and lived by the 'Sunday rules'.... The time for fasting is over with."* *"Let everyone fast for the 40 days of Lent,"* the early Christian writers urged, *"but let no one fast during the 50 days of Easter."* Eastertime was the honeymoon between God and humanity. These were the days of delight, the time for living God's reign here and now. Following the example of our early Christian brothers and sisters, for the next 50 days let us rejoice with the greatest of joy, and sing our ALLELUIAS.

EASTER WELCOME TO ALL: Although we are still encouraged to "gather at a distance" this Easter, I extend to all who have come home to be with families for Easter a very warm and gracious welcome. May God bless all with wonderful celebrations of the Lord's Resurrection.

Thank You to all who have given of themselves in decorating the church throughout Lent and into this Easter Season – especially Maria Provoznik & Samantha Stump. A gracious thanks to all who volunteered to come to pray the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent. Thanks, too, to all who participated in the *"You fly, we buy" Lenten Fish Fry.* And a profound word of gratitude to all who have sought to remain current on their Church contributions; this has been a tremendous blessing during these unprecedented times when the coronavirus has kept us from joining together for the Eucharistic celebration.

I wish you, your families, and your friends a most happy and blessed Easter and Easter season. Let us rejoice in the Risen Lord for 50 days!

On 8 April 2018, Pope Francis spoke very powerfully about today's Gospel; here's a bit of what he said:

Thomas, after seeing the Lord's wounds, cried out: "My Lord and my God!" (v. 28). I would like to reflect on the adjective that Thomas repeats: my. It is a possessive adjective. When we think about it, it might seem inappropriate to use it of God. How can God be mine? How can I make the Almighty mine? The truth is, by saying my, we do not profane God, but honor his mercy. Because God wished to "become ours." As in a love story, we tell him: "You became man for me, you died and rose for me and thus you are not only God; you are my God, you are my life. In you I have found the love that I was looking for, and much more than I could ever have imagined."


God takes no offence at being "ours," because love demands confidence, mercy demands trust. At the very beginning of the Ten Commandments, God said: "I am the Lord your God" (Ex 20:2), and reaffirmed: "I, the Lord your God am a jealous God" (v. 5). Here we see how God presents himself as a jealous lover who calls himself your God. From the depths of Thomas's heart comes the reply: "My Lord and my God!" As today we enter, through Christ's wounds, into the mystery of God, we come to realize that mercy is not simply one of his qualities among others, but the very beating of his heart. Then, like Thomas, we no longer live as disciples, uncertain, devout but wavering. We too fall in love with the Lord! We must not be afraid of these words: to fall in love with the Lord.

*A note
from our Pastor*

For nearly a year we have, thanks to a small cadre of zealous volunteers, been wiping down every routinely-touched-surface after each-and-every event at church. I have no regrets for embracing this discipline, as it was a recommendation of the Center for Disease Control (CDC) here in the US. On 5 April 2021, the CDC indicated that the chances of contracting COVID-19 from a surface is less than 1 in 10,000 – and has subsequently amended their recommendations for sanitizing. In short, highly touched surfaces should be sanitized daily (eg. door handles, light switches, restrooms, etc), but other surfaces only need to be disinfected if:

- someone who's tested positive for COVID has been on-site in the last 24 hours;
- not everyone wears a mask;
- hand hygiene is infrequent, or;
- the space is utilized by individuals at high-risk of contracting COVID-19.

In actuality, none of these aforementioned criteria are applicable. While our numbers are gradually increasing, that's due in significant part to individuals who've received their full dosage of the vaccine – and have waited the appropriate period of time following their inoculation. Furthermore, the CDC says that in lieu of sanitizing any high-risk space, one need only wait 3-days before all surfaces have (essentially) self-sanitized and are safe to touch.

The due-diligence we've exhibited over the past 11 months might now be considered "over-kill;" while I'm glad we took that approach, because I would rather be safe-than-sorry, the CDC now indicates that aggressive sanitization of minimally-touched surfaces (eg. pews & kneelers) is an insignificant-deterrent in the fight to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

As we still do have high-touched surfaces around the parish (eg. door handles, restroom switches, etc) we will continue to sanitize those surfaces after every Mass. Additionally, we will continue to promote aggressive use of hand sanitizer: upon entry, before communion, after communion – and after any trips to the restroom.

*A note
from our Pastor*

We're half-way through the Easter season and the trees are blossoming, daffodils are flowering, the days are brighter, and everywhere the world around us speaks of new life. This year more than most, the feeling of winter passing and things easing is a welcome sign of hope, as if creation itself were proclaiming that the new start we have longed for is arriving. Thanks be to God, these signs in nature seem to be matched by the long-awaited easing of the pandemic. It is a perfect time to speak of resurrection and new life.

But, as beautiful and welcome as these things are, the continued hope of the resurrection surpasses them by far. The resurrection of Jesus that we continue to celebrate is not just the hope we feel in the seasonal return of warm weather, or even the waning of a pandemic, but rather something much deeper than both: it is proof of a love that is stronger than death. In the ups and downs of life, even in the challenges, suffering, and setbacks of a pandemic, the resurrection of Christ gives us a sure foundation because it proclaims God's victory not just over the sufferings of life but over death itself. It gives us hope, not only of a temporary reprieve or a new start, but of eternal blessing that neither fades nor has an end.

The hope of the resurrection does not depend on sunny days and blue skies but rather roots us in our true home where even sunny days fade by comparison to the glory of God. It is what the Letter to the Hebrews refers to "as an anchor of the soul, sure and firm" (Hebrews 6:19). As an anchor holds a ship fast even when the wind blows, the hope of the resurrection lets us stand firm even when spring fades to the heat of summer and, eventually, winter returns, because we know that too will pass and only love will remain.

So, we rejoice in the beauty of nature, the return of the sun, and the hope of health and normalcy to come. And we continue to rejoice even more that, because of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection, our names are written in heaven (Cf. Luke 10:20).

I'm sure you've noticed, as have I, that our attendance has been steadily rising. As a result, it's not uncommon for the 4pm Mass at Sacred Heart to fill beyond COVID capacity; the same is true for the 8:15am Mass at St. Patrick. As I regularly welcome back, to in-person worship, parishioners whom I haven't seen in over a year, it's not uncommon for them to say: "It's great to be back. We got our second shot 2 weeks ago, so now we feel safe returning to church."

While I am elated over the increasing numbers, the seating guidelines we're currently following (which date back to May 2020) do put a hard limit on seating capacity. That said, recent directives from the Center for Disease Control (CDC) have indicated that individuals who are fully-vaccinated may be in the presence of other fully-vaccinated individuals without either party wearing a mask. While appropriate for small home gatherings, I believe there is a corollary that could afford us the option of accommodating more individuals than our present seating plan allows. In fact, in the news on 4/22, the LA Dodgers are taking a similar approach in 2 sections of their stadium!

While we need to maintain 6-feet of social distancing for everyone who's not been vaccinated, and realizing that some vaccinated individuals still desire to maintain a minimum 6-feet of social distancing, recent CDC directives about vaccinated individuals would seem to allow us the option of considering an alternate social-distancing plan for vaccinated individuals who would be comfortable sitting closer than 6-feet from other vaccinated individuals. In this section fully-vaccinated individuals would still be required to wear masks, but could sit 3-feet from other parties ... and this reduced distancing would allow us the option of using every pew in the designated area (rather than every-other pew for 6-feet of requisite distancing).

Do I have concerns about even suggesting this option? Absolutely! The last thing I want to do is promote any prejudice, class-distinction, or "hey, look at us – we're vaccinated" division within the parish. I'm simply trying to think "outside of the box" to identify a safe way for us to accommodate the continually increasing numbers of people attending Mass – while still maintaining a very safe environment for all. (Going with a "reduced social distancing section" will forestall the need to return to the reserved seating model that was necessary for Easter Masses).

A few frequently asked questions (FAQ's) that come to mind about a reduced social distancing section would be:

- ***If I'm vaccinated, but not comfortable sitting closer than 6', do I have to sit in that section?*** Absolutely NOT. Sitting in a reduced social distancing environment is purely voluntary.
- ***I'm vaccinated, but my spouse is not (or my children are not) vaccinated. Can we sit together in the reduced social distancing section?*** Unfortunately, no. CDC guidelines are still quite clear that non-vaccinated individuals must retain a minimum 6' of social distancing.
- ***If everyone in the reduced social distancing section is vaccinated, can we take off our masks?*** Masks MUST BE WORN by EVERYONE attending Mass in the Diocese of Cleveland – regardless of where they choose to sit in the church.
- ***I received my second dose yesterday; can I sit in the reduced social distancing section?*** Drug manufacturers have indicated that one is not fully-vaccinated against COVID-19 until they're two-weeks beyond their second dose. Until sufficient time has passed following your final vaccination, one must maintain the full 6-feet of social distancing.





*A note
from our Pastor*

The link between the celebration of the Ascension and Pentecost should not be overlooked. The early Church in Jerusalem celebrated the concluding

Easter mysteries of the Ascension and Pentecost on the same day; whereas, the other Churches celebrated them separately and on the days suggested by the Acts of the Apostles. It was not until sometime in the 5th century that the Ascension was celebrated separately from Pentecost within Jerusalem itself. The nine days between Ascension (Thursday) and Pentecost are the origin of the later practice of observing “novenas,” nine days of prayer in preparation for a major feast or for a special request. (The Bishops of the United States moved the observance of the Ascension from Thursday to Sunday for most dioceses in the US; only dioceses along the east-coast, and Lincoln NE, retain the Thursday celebration). The Acts of the Apostles tells us that following the Ascension, the Apostles gathered in the upper room “and devoted themselves with one accord to prayer, together with some women, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers” (1:13-14). It was in this upper room on Mount Zion that disciples waited for the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Ascension of Jesus and the giving of the Holy Spirit are linked by a novena of prayers.

Though the Easter season does not conclude with the celebration of the Ascension, it is however the culmination of Christ’s Paschal Mystery (his death and resurrection). With the Ascension of Jesus to the Father, humanity itself was brought into heaven. The Ascension of our Lord is therefore “our exultation” too. As the Catechism teaches: “Christ’s ascension marks the definitive entrance of Jesus’ humanity into God’s heavenly domain, whence he will come again (cf. Acts 1:11)... Jesus Christ, the head of the Church, precedes us into the Father’s glorious kingdom so that we, members of his Body, may live in the hope of one day being with him forever.

Jesus Christ, having entered the sanctuary of heaven once for all, intercedes constantly for us as the mediator who assures us of the permanent outpouring of the Holy Spirit (nos. 665-667). The Catholic dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary affirms the more central beliefs in Christ’s Ascension and our future bodily resurrection.

The Bishops of Ohio Announce the Lifting of the Dispensation from the Obligation to attend Holy Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation

May 13, 2021

As we move beyond the worst of the coronavirus pandemic and access to the COVID-19 vaccine has become more widespread, the time has arrived for the good of all the faithful when the general dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is no longer necessary.

Together, the Bishops of Ohio have decided that the general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (including the Saturday/Vigil Mass) is to be reinstated (CIC, can. 1247). This will take effect in each of the Dioceses of Ohio the weekend of June 5-6, 2021. As has always been the case, those who have a serious reason are exempt from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2181). This includes those who are ill, have *significant* health risk factors or care for someone who is immuno-compromised or ill, as well as those who have significant fear or anxiety of contracting the coronavirus in a large group of persons. Nevertheless, these persons should observe the Lord's Day (CIC, can. 1247) and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's passion, death and resurrection; an appropriate way to do this is through viewing a broadcast of the Sunday Mass. Masses that are broadcast through various media are not intended as a substitute nor do they fulfill the obligation for the persons who are able to gather for a Sunday celebration and other Holy Days of Obligation. Instead, they are intended for the sick, home-bound, the imprisoned, etc., who are unable to attend Mass in person. Kindly consult your pastor with any specific questions regarding the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.

The book of Exodus reminds us to keep holy the Sabbath day (Exodus 20: 8-10). As Catholics, we are invited by God to gather together in community, and participate fully in the Sunday Eucharist, which is the "source and summit of the Christian life." "Participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a testimony of belonging and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church. The faithful give witness by this to their communion in faith and charity. Together they testify to God's holiness and their hope of salvation. They strengthen one another under the guidance of the Holy Spirit" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2182).

The obligation to attend Mass on Sunday and Holy Days is not something God asks of us out of his own necessity to be worshipped, but rather a gift to the faithful for their spiritual well-being, eternal salvation and formation in our relationship with God and one another. To that end, Saint John Vianney rightly asserts, "There is nothing so great as the Eucharist. If God had something more precious, He would have given it to us." The Eucharist is the greatest gift Christ left to the Church—the gift of Himself. There is no substitute for Mass celebrated in person.

We are profoundly grateful to our pastors and all of the faithful for their flexibility, fidelity and great generosity in support of the mission of the Church throughout this unprecedented time. As we prepare for the reinstatement of the obligation to attend Mass, we are excited once again to gather together in person without restrictions in our parish churches, most fittingly on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. As we reflect on our Lord's goodness and mercy in the midst of the sacrifices made during the coronavirus pandemic, we ask Saint Joseph to intercede for us, that through his fatherly protection and care, we may experience a renewal of faith in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

We welcome you back with great joy and eagerness!



*A note
from our Pastor*

This weekend we conclude the Easter season with the feast of Pentecost, fifty days after the Resurrection. In so doing the church is following, according to Pope St. John Paul II, our “elder brother in faith” – namely, the Jewish people. The feast of Pentecost was a Jewish feast of new grain, new wine, the first fruits of the harvest. It was held fifty days after Passover, thus the (albeit Greek) name “Pentecost,” which means fifty. The Book of Acts tells us that it was on this feast that Peter was emboldened by the Holy Spirit to speak to the Jewish pilgrims who had assembled in Jerusalem that day. As Luke tells it in Acts, it was on that day that the Spirit was given to the disciples and poured out onto the crowds who were listening to Peter preach. But our gospel reading is not from Acts (as it is not a gospel) nor is it from Luke (the author of Acts). Instead, we have a reading from the Gospel of John whereby Jesus gives the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The episode in the Gospel of John in this weekend’s passage [Jn 20: 19-23] happens on Easter Sunday evening. It is on that day that Jesus gives the disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit in a graphic, nearly sacramental way—by breathing on them. Jesus’ presence brought joy to the disciples whose spirits needed revivification after the tragic events that had so recently transpired.

Whether the handing on of the Spirit happened on Easter Sunday evening as John says, or on Pentecost as Luke says, the key theological point is that the Spirit was given to the early Christian community. The Spirit has been with the church, the community of disciples, ever since. In fact, the same spirit is alive in each of our congregations and parishes. Rather than a historical event trapped in the past, the handing on of the Spirit continues to happen quite regularly in the lives of believers, and that ultimately is what the feast of Pentecost celebrates: the presence of the Spirit in the lives of believers.

How many of us would like to have been present during the ministry of Jesus, or even during that of the early Christians? What would it have been like to hear the words of Peter at Pentecost? What would it have been like to have seen the risen Jesus and to have heard him say, “Peace be with you” before handing on the Holy Spirit? Yet, for those of us in the twenty-first century, we experience that same Holy Spirit. When we were baptized, we were given the gift of the Spirit, and then we were sealed by that same spirit in Confirmation. The Holy Spirit lives in our parishes, families, friends, and relationships. Once we experience the dying and rising of Christ, we live in a newness of life accompanied and animated by the Holy Spirit. After he rose from the dead, Jesus gave his Holy Spirit to be with us. In our daily lives, let us allow ourselves to be guided by the Spirit of Christ, whose disciples we are.

As we gather closer together for the celebration of the sacraments, let’s think about the positive effects of these past 14 months as we’ve lived through a pandemic. How has the Holy Spirit alive within us, drawn us deeper in our faith? I know many have missed (and some will continue to miss) receiving communion. Numerous parishioners

have told me that they’ll never take the gift of the Eucharist for granted again; not being able to receive it as over throughout the past year has been difficult.

God created us, not to live in isolation but to be social beings - and as such meant for us to gather in community to support, encourage and love one another. I hope that as we can begin to set aside masks and social-distancing, and return to a routine that’s more familiar to us that we don’t forget the things we learned we could (and could not) live without ... and will continue to embrace those things that we found/find life-giving. I firmly believe that we will emerge from this pandemic a stronger and better parish – and Church.



from our Pastor*

Typically the parish hosts a missionary to help heighten our awareness of the many missionary efforts that are underway in our world. Last year, because we were in the early stages of the pandemic, all hosting of missionaries was suspended. Gratefully, we're now at a point where we can continue this long-standing tradition.

Next weekend we will welcome Fr. Bruno Piccolo, a PIME (Pontifical Institute for Foreign Missions) priest ordained in Memphis, Michigan in 1965. Following his ordination Fr. Bruno worked at PIME's Minor Seminary in Oakland, NJ through 1969 and that year he was assigned as a missionary to the Philippines. He returned from the Philippines in 1977 and worked in vocations and formation for students attending the Chicago Theological Union (1978-1993) and then as Pastor of St Patrick Parish in Los Angeles, CA (1988-1991). In 1994 he worked as a missionary in PIME's mission in Cuanacaxtitlan, Guerrero, Mexico and returned to the U.S. in 1995. In 1995 he was elected U.S. Regional Superior of PIME and served in this position through 2005. After 2005 Fr. Bruno returned to Italy working at PIME's Mission Center in Naples, Italy; as the Regional Superior of PIME's Italian Region and as Rector of the House working in youth lay missionary ministry in Villa Grugana, Italy. Fr. Bruno was assigned to the U.S. in 2017 ministering at St Ann & St Lucy in New York City through 2019 and is currently ministering in the Detroit, MI community.

As I will be taking the opportunity of Fr. Bruno's visit to participate in a sabbatical class reunion in Chicago next weekend, I will be unable to spend time with Fr. Bruno while he is in town.

In this “new era” where masks are no longer required, the Diocese of Cleveland is still encouraging the unvaccinated, and those at risk, to continue wearing a mask. The reason being: as Christians, although we are not responsible for others, the Gospel calls us to exhibit responsibility toward others. In other words: if I am at higher risk of contracting or spreading COVID and do not take steps to continue mitigating the spread of the virus, then I have not truly been responsible toward my neighbor. So, while it's true that masks are now legally optional, the Gospel would challenge us to ask: *If I am at greater risk for contracting or spreading COVID would the simple act of wearing a mask benefit the health and well-being of others and myself?*

- After the sign-of-peace (which is just before communion), and;
- When you return to the pew following communion.

from our Pastor*

For more than a year we've been gathering at a "social distance" – and it's been 15 months since we've been able to have any semblance of proximity to one another.

Gratefully, we're now again gathered with the option of utilizing every pew and resembling a community once-again.

Living through the pandemic hasn't been easy for any of us, and we've each limped through it in our own way. But anytime one "limps" it indicates something being out-of-order – and so I'd like to welcome you back with an apology for the shortfalls I've exhibited as pastor throughout this pandemic. A couple of "limps" that come to mind are:

- Living on the doorstep of the Toledo Diocese, which seemed to have a much looser interpretation of Gov. DeWine's directives than did the Cleveland Diocese, I know some were annoyed that I wasn't more lenient in my adherence to Cleveland's directives. As a result, I know some traveled into Huron County to worship, because they didn't feel as welcomed or fulfilled by worshipping in an environment with stricter COVID protocols – and there were others who felt comfortable gathering because of the stricter protocols.
- As I sought to reach out, whether via phone calls or emails, I heard from some who felt uncomfortable by the contact – and from others who felt my efforts fell woefully short.

So, as we gather for the first time in 15 months, I want to express my sincere apology for any hurt or pain you experienced during this pandemic because of the way that I, or the parish, failed to live up to your needs or expectations. And I look forward to how God is going to utilize all our experiences of this pandemic to help us grow to a deeper appreciation of community, the Eucharist, and Sunday Mass.

If you forgot that Fr. Bruno was coming this weekend for the annual missionary appeal and left your checkbook at home, you are welcome to place your check in the basket next weekend (in an envelope marked Fr. Bruno) and we'll make sure it gets to him.

Just a reminder about the annual missionary appeal. Each year the Diocese of Cleveland receives far more missionary requests than it has parishes. Thus, 90¢ of every dollar you donate goes to the PIME Missionaries (of which Fr. Bruno is a member); the remaining 10¢ of every dollar is split between the missionary orders whose requests for appealing at a parish in the Diocese of Cleveland could not be accommodated. In the end, 100% of every dollar you

give goes to the missions – but only 90% of it will go to the PIME Missionaries.

Lastly, next weekend's *Community Outreach Collection* will also benefit the PIME Missionaries.

from our Pastor*

Having spent a few days with sabbatical classmates in Chicago, a good thought for us to ponder this summer is: *How to Keep God in Your Day When You're Traveling?* The St. John Institute shares the following thoughts on their website:

The U.S. Travel Association reported that direct spending on leisure travel by domestic and international travelers totaled \$718.4 billion in 2017, and nearly three out of four domestic trips taken were for leisure purposes. Adding in business travel spending brought the total up to \$1,036 billion in traveler spending in 2017, generating \$2.4 trillion in economic output and supporting 15.6 million American jobs.

As these hefty statistics show, over the last few decades travel has become an increasingly prevalent opportunity and even expectation for our personal life and for business. Whether your travel experiences be for leisure or business, don't let them be occasions of your priorities being upended. Even if you're taking a break from work while you're traveling, preserve the proper order in your life by maintaining your relationship, through prayer, with the triune God.

Know that the Traveling Goal is Good

One way to keep God as the center of your day while you're traveling is to embrace the fact that the goal of your travel is good—it is good that you have this job that entails visiting new places, or that your family is taking this vacation.

Be at peace knowing that the goal of your traveling is a good one. Along the way, be receptive to the graces that the journey has to offer. Travel can be a beautiful reminder of the immensity of God, that there is a wideness in His mercy. Let the little blessings of the journey, the way people show you hospitality and the beauty of new natural sights, remind you of God's greatness. G. K. Chesterton commented that "the traveler sees what he sees, the tourist sees what he has come to see." Don't be so set on controlling what you will see and what you will do that you don't actually see all that is available to you!

And what about the inconveniences and failures of hospitality you encounter along the way? Traveling can be a reminder that life is a pilgrimage, with ups and down on the way to a good goal. In fact, traveling is almost like a microcosm of our life, and a good opportunity to practice preserving our equilibrium. If the goal of our journey is good—and God is with us along the way—then a two-hour flight delay shouldn't upend our peace. God is present, even in that moment of delay and frustration.

Physical Reminders

Another way to intentionally invite God into your travel is to bring items with you that serve as physical reminders of Him. Bringing items to remind you to keep God first does not have to add bulk. Keeping your rosary in your pocket or a holy card as a bookmark in your planner can be a simple but effective way to remind yourself of God's presence, regardless of where you are. Such reminders can also be a subtle way to witness to the Catholic faith. If holding a rosary or wearing a scapular prompts a conversation, don't be afraid of that! There is an intrinsic persuasiveness to the beauty and structure of the truths of Catholicism, and God works even through our imperfect airport conversations.

Keep an eye out for other physical reminders of God. If you have extra time at the airport, see if it has a chapel and take the opportunity for some quiet time there. If you are driving, is there a shrine or Church off the highway that you can stop at for a holy half-hour?

Have Your Apps Ready

There's a lot of truth to Antoine de Saint Exupery's comment that "He who would travel happily must travel light." You might not want to carry prayer books and devotionals with you on your trip. But traveling light is very achievable by having your smartphone and apps ready to

support you in your prayer life en route. Download the next week's Divine Office on iBreviary so you can pray the liturgy regardless of reliable WiFi availability. Download some Catholic podcasts so you have easy, uplifting options for spending your time well as you wait in the airport or rest on the plane.

Also, before praying the Divine Office on your phone, be sure to switch your phone to airplane mode. Having a text message or notification pop up during prayer is a huge distraction, and one you can do without. Allow those seven minutes or so to be singularly focused on God and as distraction-free as possible.

Moreover, while having the spiritual resources you need on hand is essential, the noisy, oft-crowdedness of airports, bus terminals, and travel spaces can sometimes be surprisingly fruitful ones for self-reflection. Don't be afraid to use traveling time to enter into interior silence, regardless of outside noise.

Plan Intentionally

Finally, it's not a crime against spontaneity to begin your vacation day with the question, "What are my hopes for this day?" Do I need to spend at least an hour or so in reflection? Am I feeling called to friendship and engagement with others, to spend a day sight-seeing with family or friends?

Making a plan means that you've made an intentional choice, and hopefully a good one! At the end of the day, you won't be wondering where the hours went and why you didn't get prayer time in, because you'll have already thought about and planned for your priorities for the day.

If you're traveling for fun with others, for instance, you could even start this question for the group, asking over breakfast, "What are everyone's goals for today?"

Coming Home

It can be disorienting to experience jet lag, time with far-away friends, and changes of scenery, only to find yourself suddenly submerged back home in your old routine again. But living in such a way that God is your first priority, both at home and during travel, makes transitioning through place easier.

One of the special "graces" of traveling is the new perspective it can give you to wonder about and appreciate where you've come from. George Orwell said that to see what is in front of your nose is a constant struggle. This can be true with ideas and beliefs, and it is certainly true with our physical locations! Let travel be a reminder that life is a pilgrimage, and let coming home be an opportunity for re-seeing where you started and appreciating it all the more.

God is with us, always. Let our times of traveling be an opportunity to strengthen our friendship with Him, uniting to Him in prayer whether we're in the wilderness, on the beach, or in an airplane miles above ground.

*A note
from our Pastor*

Bishop David M. O'Connell of Trenton, NJ has a phenomenal way with words. I was impressed when I read them last year, & share them with you now:

Like "Mother's Day" in the United States, "Father's Day" celebrations began here in the early 20th century. Their true origins, however, are rooted in Catholic religious devotions to St. Joseph in the Middle Ages. For the most part, the national observance of "Father's Day" is a secular holiday.

For us as Catholics who cherish family life as an "ideal" modeled by the Holy Family, it is important to stop and recognize or remember our dads, living or deceased, on this day dedicated to them.

Throughout the Scriptures, God is presented and affirmed as "Father." Yes, I acknowledge the issues raised by some when speaking of God as "masculine," but the Scriptures refer to the Creator that way as does our long Church tradition. The fact of faith with which we can all agree is that God is the source of our existence.

"Honor your father and mother" is one of the Ten Commandments with which we are all familiar. "Father's Day" certainly responds to that command. Hopefully the "honor" extends for more than just one Sunday in June!

In ordinary usage, "father" conveys the notions of "provider," "guardian," "caretaker," in roles that complement and share a mother's "unconditional love." Although, unfortunately, some of us have grown up without the presence or love of a father in our lives for any number of reasons, the concept of "fatherhood" is a noble one, worth our respect and recognition.

So often in the life of the Lord Jesus as told in the Gospels, we find him in all kinds of conversations with his "Father," the term he most often uses to describe or address God. Not surprisingly, we find the same type of references in other New Testament writings. That, in itself, conveys something very profound for all of us who are or use the title "father" in our own lives. The expression "father" is an invitation, really, for men so called, to imitate and pattern their "paternity" on the loving care of our "heavenly Father," no small task!

Apart from the difficulties that, sadly, may exist in some family situations, to "be" a "father" or to "have" a "father," denotes one of the two most important relationships any person can have in the world. Fathers need to keep that in mind and reflect upon it daily. Daughters and sons need to keep that in mind and reflect upon it daily. Spouses and mothers also need to keep that in mind and reflect upon it daily as they share their loving responsibilities with fathers.

One thing I have observed and heard about from families in these times of pandemic is that "staying home" required by the declared state of emergency has actually "re-introduced" family members to one another. Being together at home for most of the day, taking meals together, watching TV together, doing school lessons or other work together,

watching live-streamed Masses together have enabled the roles within a family to become more defined and – despite a little spat here and there – have drawn families closer together, especially with the father's presence more pronounced.

In my neighborhood, I have enjoyed watching "dads" outside playing with their children, walking with their wives and family, and even – bravely – getting used to riding a bike again with their little ones. These scenes are the beautiful, positive and happy consequences of a not so positive and happy pandemic. Perhaps the past few months have been a teachable moment!

Going back to the Lord Jesus, Mark's Gospel relates a conversation with his Heavenly Father in the Garden of Gethsemane, addressing him as "Abba, Father (Mark 14:36)," an expression used two other times in the Letters of St. Paul to the Romans and Galatians. While scripture scholars love to debate such usages, it is basically an Aramaic word for "father." Translators make the case that it connotes a genuine, deep intimacy between parent and child but not in a childish way.

That makes sense, given the fact that the adult Lord Jesus uses it during the Agony in the Garden. There is an urgent dependency in the account and the Lord Jesus turns to "Abba, Father" in his moment of need. But it can certainly be used in other circumstances as well to express the depth of the relationship: one of a father's creating, caring, affirming, listening, challenging and, above all, loving a son or a daughter, no matter what their age, and of a son or a daughter returning that love.

The "teacher" in me sometimes takes over, so let me return to the topic at hand: Father's Day!

Secular though it may have become in our country, let's make the celebration of this holiday here in our Diocese an occasion, a moment of faith. I invite you to be grateful to God our Father – first, foremost and always – for creating and sustaining us as his sons and daughters. And, then, express gratitude to God for our own fathers and all that they have done for us and mean to us.

Fathers, renew your loving care and commitment to your children and families. Make sure they know how much you love them. Daughters and sons, "honor your father and mother," not just on a holiday named for them but each and every day. Don't let the relationship slip through your hands. Keep in touch and do so in a way that drives the message home – like the TV commercial, "I love you Dad" ... and repeats it often, not just in words.

Father's Day is not simply another secular occasion for greeting card companies to cash in. No, it is an experience of family life that deserves to be celebrated as an aspect of our faith as well.

Fathers are with us in our homes and families all too short a while – but they live in our hearts forever!

God bless all our dads, living and departed. Happy Father's Day!

*A note
from our Pastor*

On June 29 the Church celebrates the feast day of Sts. Peter & Paul. As early as the year 258, there is evidence of an already lengthy tradition of celebrating the solemnities of both Saint Peter and Saint Paul on the same day. Together, the two saints are the founders of the See of Rome, through their preaching, ministry and martyrdom there.

Peter, who was named Simon, was a fisherman of Galilee and was introduced to the Lord Jesus by his brother Andrew, also a fisherman. Jesus gave him the name Cephas (Petrus in Latin), which means 'Rock,' because he was to become the rock upon which Christ would build His Church.

Peter was a bold follower of the Lord. He was the first to recognize that Jesus was "the Messiah, the Son of the living God," and eagerly pledged his fidelity until death. In his boldness, he also made many mistakes, however, such as losing faith when walking on water with Christ and betraying the Lord on the night of His passion.

Yet despite his human weaknesses, Peter was chosen to shepherd God's flock. The Acts of the Apostles illustrates his role as head of the Church after the Resurrection and Ascension of Christ. Peter led the Apostles as the first Pope and ensured that the disciples kept the true faith.

St. Peter spent his last years in Rome, leading the Church through persecution and eventually being martyred in the year 64. He was crucified upside-down at his own request, because he claimed he was not worthy to die as his Lord.

He was buried on Vatican hill, and St. Peter's Basilica is built over his tomb.

St. Paul was the Apostle of the Gentiles. His letters are included in the writings of the New Testament, and through them we learn much about his life and the faith of the early Church.

Before receiving the name Paul, he was Saul, a Jewish pharisee who zealously persecuted Christians in Jerusalem. Scripture records that Saul was present at the martyrdom of St. Stephen.

Saul's conversion took place as he was on his way to Damascus to persecute the Christian community there. As he was traveling along the road, he was suddenly surrounded by a great light from heaven. He was blinded and fell off his horse. He then heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He answered: "Who are you, Lord?" Christ said: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting."

Saul continued to Damascus, where he was baptized and his sight was restored. He took the name Paul and spent the remainder of his life preaching the Gospel tirelessly to the Gentiles of the Mediterranean world.

Paul was imprisoned and taken to Rome, where he was beheaded in the year 67.

He is buried in Rome in the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls.

In a sermon in the year 395, St. Augustine of Hippo said of Sts. Peter and Paul: "Both apostles share the same feast day, for these two were one; and even though they suffered on different days, they were as one. Peter went first, and Paul followed. And so we celebrate this day made holy for us by the apostles' blood. Let us embrace what they believed, their life, their labors, their sufferings, their preaching, and their confession of faith."

from our Pastor*

The following column appeared in the June 30, 2019 bulletin of Blessed Virgin Mary Parish in Darby, PA where Msgr. Joseph Corley served as pastor. Msgr.

Corley died on June 29, the day before the bulletin was distributed, after a short illness.

The Gospel of Matthew includes the internationally known and respected "Sermon on the Mount" (Mt 5:1-12). Let's focus our attention on the first beatitude: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of God."

First, keep in mind the word "blessed" can be interpreted as "happy."

Second, when Jesus refers to the "poor in spirit," he is talking about anyone, rich or poor, who is aware of his or her dependence upon God.

Third, the statement "theirs is the kingdom of God" means those who acknowledge their dependence upon God, and do God's will, have already allowed God to rule their hearts. They give glory to God, who is in them.

How does the beatitude apply to us?

Matthew wrote the Beatitudes to inspire disciples like us. The evangelist wanted to turn readers' attention to the most fundamental virtue of discipleship — humility, which is another word for being poor in spirit. The Sermon on the Mount assures the humble of God's presence and favor in their struggles.

We live in a culture that admires independence and individualism. The Gospels, however, praise spiritual dependence and community life. The Beatitudes are a modern-day Christian's "Declaration of Dependence" upon God.

Pray for the virtue of humility, and be happy knowing that, like Jesus, you are poor in spirit.

A note

You've heard it before; maybe you're even the one who said it: "I don't need the Church to be close to Jesus -- no Bishop or Pope is going to tell me what to do." Yet, we have to face one major fact: Jesus gave to the apostles and their successors his authority. That means the Church is apostolic. That's how we know what we believe is what Jesus wants us to believe. The Holy Spirit keeps the Church faithful to the teaching the apostles heard from Christ by giving the authority of Christ and the apostles to the bishops, assisted by the priests, in union with the successor of Peter, the Pope. Everybody wants to know the truth, to belong to people who truly are in touch with Jesus. The Church is such a community and she remains that way because the Holy Spirit lives in her. But we can't just leave it at that. How does the Holy Spirit keep the Church close to Christ? That's where popes and bishops, priests and deacons come in. Human though they are, they possess the Holy Spirit in a special way that keeps them in contact with the original Gospel preached by Christ.

That's what is spectacular about our Catholic faith--we are always assured that the true message of Christ is preserved, even though individual leaders and members might not measure up to our standards. Think about it. Through 2000 years of war, darkness, prejudice, pride, human frailty--you name it--there has always been the true thread of the Gospel in the Catholic Church. That ought to give us stability, comfort, and certainty. Maybe it also explains why we've been around so long. Christ said He wouldn't leave us alone. He said His Spirit would always guide us. Perhaps we shouldn't be so quick to judge the Church wrong on some issues. Listen closely next time you go to Mass. Whispering through cathedral columns and parish church aisles is the sound of truth, a fresh breeze that always comes from the Holy Spirit.

PIZZA SUB PRODUCTION & BOOTH

Note on pizza sub production: Due to changes in the delivery days for the buns we use, we are looking at changing our start day for the first day of sub production (which previous years has been the Friday before the week of the fair). This first day of production we make our greatest number of subs, 960 subs; this is almost double the number we will make each day during fair week.

Reminder: it is health department requirements that all wear a hat or hair net and gloves. Hair nets are available; gloves are provided. If we have a good number of workers we will be using the hall to make subs as well so we can spread out and have plenty of work space.

Also, please note, the above information is only for the first day of sub production. We will be making subs Monday through Friday the week of the fair starting at 9:30am.

The **sign-up sheet to work the booth** at the fair will also be at the church entrance.

We served 50 households in June, for a total of 110 people with 26 being children.

from our Pastor*

Pope Francis has declared this upcoming July 25th (next Sunday) to be the first World Day for Grandparents and the elderly. The Holy Father hopes that by celebrating this

day we will work against the trend in our Modern society to neglect the elderly. How sad it is that in our busy lives we can often forget grandparents and elders who have done so much for us, who often go for long periods of time alone with no visitors. This neglect has only been exacerbated by the isolation they have experienced during the pandemic, so it is fitting that now we make an extra effort to reach out to them.

With this celebration, the Holy Father has granted a plenary indulgence to grandparents, the elderly, and all the faithful on July 25th. To obtain this indulgence, one must make a Sacramental confession, receive the Holy Eucharist and pray during the solemn celebration that the Pope will preside over in St. Peter's Basilica, or at other celebrations that will be held throughout the world. According to a note from the Apostolic Penitentiary, the plenary indulgence is also granted to the faithful who devote adequate time to visit the elderly in need or in difficulty, whether in person or virtually. Finally, this plenary indulgence may also be granted to those who are unable to leave their homes for serious reasons and unite themselves spiritually to the sacred functions of the World Day for Grandparents and elderly, offering to the Merciful God their prayers, pains or sufferings of their lives.

Let's all consider joining with the Holy Father and the universal Church in celebrating this day, participating through prayer and taking the time to visit loved ones in need.



*A note
from our Pastor*

This Friday, August 6th, is the *Solemnity of the Transfiguration*. This is a feast that might also be described as a *preview of coming attractions*. After all,

our final destination is a person, more than a place.

When one considers the Transfiguration, it was not a miracle that Jesus Christ transfigured Himself on Mount Tabor before the Apostles; it was a miracle that He maintained His common, earthly appearance for the whole of His life. It was a miracle that His face was not glowing like the sun as He walked the hills and valleys of the Holy Land. Christ's normality, His sustained suppression of His divine radiance, was a miracle of humility, of slavish devotion to His vocation to incarnate, teach, suffer, and die for mankind.

The Christian believes in the resurrection of the body and life everlasting in that body. We believe this because of the appearances of the risen Christ after His resurrection, because of His bodily Ascension into heaven, because the gospels specifically mention the empty tomb, and because of the events of today's feast. The Transfiguration shows the splendor of truth. It is a peek into the life of heaven, where we see that Christ will not shed His human skin. Christ will bring His humanity to heaven and glorify it. This exaltation of flesh and blood is one reason why the Church has such immense respect for the human body.

The Church's understanding is contrasted by two extreme views on its flanks: one overly spiritualizing man, and the other overly materializing him. But neither an excessively spiritual approach nor an excessively material understanding do the body justice. A balanced understanding of the relationship between the body and soul is a hallmark of traditional Christianity. When Christ reveals His glory, He doesn't point a long, bony finger to a rainbow on the horizon. He doesn't puff His cheeks and blow a strong rush of wind on the Apostles' faces. And He doesn't sit down and start playing soothing melodies on a harp. Rather, Christ shows the Apostles the truth by showing them Himself. He shows them His arms and legs and torso and face and hair. It's a real body. Jesus gives us a target to aim for. He shows us that the destination is Himself. We desire heaven because Jesus is there. If He were not there, then heaven would not be heaven. He, not a place, is the true destination.

Lord of the Transfiguration, Your glorified body gives us hope of the glories to come in heaven, where You will be the destination. May Your glorified body inspire all Christians to live well their body-soul uniqueness on earth until they are perfected in heaven through You.



*A note
from our Pastor*

Today, Catholics and many other Christians celebrate the feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This significant feast day recalls the spiritual & physical departure of the mother of Jesus Christ from the earth, when both her soul and her body were taken into the presence of God.

Venerable Pope Pius XII confirmed this belief about the Virgin Mary as the perennial teaching of the Church when he defined it formally as a dogma of Catholic faith in 1950, invoking papal infallibility to proclaim, "that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory."

His Apostolic Constitution "Munificentissimus Deus" (Most Bountiful God), which defined the dogma, contained the Pontiff's accounts of many longstanding traditions by which the Church has celebrated the Assumption throughout its history. The constitution also cited testimonies from the early Church fathers on the subject, and described the history of theological reflection on many Biblical passages which are seen as indicating that Mary was assumed into heaven following her death.

Although the bodily assumption of Mary is not explicitly recorded in Scripture, Catholic tradition identifies her with the "woman clothed with the sun" who is described in the 12th chapter of the Book of Revelation. The passage calls that woman's appearance "a great sign" which "appeared in heaven," indicating that she is the mother of the Jewish Messiah and has "the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars." Accordingly, Catholic iconography of the Western tradition often depicts the Virgin Mary's assumption into heaven in this manner.

Eastern Christians have also traditionally held Mary's assumption into heaven as an essential component of their faith. Pius XII cited several early Byzantine liturgical texts, as well as the eighth-century Arab Christian theologian St. John of Damascus, in his own authoritative definition of her assumption. "It was fitting," St. John of Damascus wrote in a sermon on the assumption, "that she, who had kept her virginity intact in childbirth, should keep her own body free from all corruption even after death," and "that she, who had carried the creator as a child at her breast, should dwell in the divine tabernacles."

In Eastern Christian tradition, the same feast is celebrated on the same calendar date, although typically known as the Dormition (falling asleep) of Mary. Eastern Catholic celebration of the Dormition is preceded by a two-week period of fasting which is similar to Lent. Pius XII, in "Munificentissimus Deus," mentioned this same fasting period as belonging to the traditional patrimony of Western Christians as well.

*A note
from our Pastor*

Mary's title as "Queen of Heaven and Earth" is a great scandal to many non-Catholic Christians. After all, the Bible doesn't mention anything about there being a queen in God's kingdom. All this royal attention Catholics give to Mary—whether it's singing "Hail, holy queen enthroned above" or portraying Mary in statues and paintings with a crown on her head—seems to many non-Catholics to detract from the royalty of Christ, who alone is King of Kings. Besides, how could Mary be a queen, since she is not the wife of the King—but only his mother?

One biblical theme sheds light on these questions and serves as a key for unlocking the mystery of Mary's queenship: the Old Testament tradition of the "queen mother" in the Davidic kingdom.

In the monarchy of King David, as well as in other ancient kingdoms of the Near East, the mother of the ruling king held an important office in the royal court and played a key part in the process of dynastic succession. In fact, the king's mother ruled as queen, not his wife.

The great pre-eminence of the king's mother may seem odd from our modern Western perspective, in which we think of a queen as being the wife of a king. However, recall that most ancient Near-Eastern kings practiced polygamy. King Solomon had seven hundred wives (1 Kgs. 11:3)—imagine the chaos in the royal court if all seven hundred were awarded the queenship! But since each king had only one mother, one can see the practical wisdom in bestowing the queenship upon her.

A number of Old Testament passages reflect the important role of the queen mother in the Davidic kingdom. For example, almost every time the narrative of 1 and 2 Kings introduces a new monarch in Judah, it mentions the king's mother as well, showing the mother's intimate involvement in her royal son's reign. Similarly, the queen mother is listed among the members of the royal court whom king Jehoiachin surrendered to the king of Babylon in 2 Kings 24:12.

Last week's Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary into heaven is a celebration that ranks higher than a Sunday – which is why it was celebrated in lieu of the Sunday Mass. Today's celebration of coronation of Mary as Queen of Heaven and Earth is a memorial, whose liturgical rank is less than that of a Sunday – which is why today's focus is on the Sunday readings for the 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time.

The Memorial of the Queenship of Mary was first instituted in 1954 by Pope Pius XII. According to Catholic tradition, as Christ is king of the world and saves the people from their sins, Mary is queen over the earth because of her role in the story of divine redemption, serving as mother to the Savior. Pope Benedict XVI described this relationship, saying:

"The small and simple young girl of Nazareth became Queen of the world! This is one of the marvels that reveal God's Heart. Of course, Mary's queenship is totally relative to Christ's kingship. He is the Lord whom after the humiliation of death on the Cross the Father exalted above any other creature in Heaven and on earth and under the earth (cf. Phil 2: 9-11). Through a design of grace, the Immaculate Mother was fully associated with the mystery of the Son: in his Incarnation; in his earthly life, at first hidden at Nazareth and then manifested in the messianic ministry; in his Passion and death; and finally, in the glory of his Resurrection and Ascension into Heaven."

A message from Bishop Malesic on keeping people safe during the pandemic

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

The latest information from federal, state and local public health agencies informs us that the Delta variant of the COVID-19 virus is surging in our area, causing increased illness and hospitalizations at levels not seen since the spring. For the safety of all who worship at Catholic parishes throughout the Diocese of Cleveland, I strongly encourage you -- whether vaccinated or not vaccinated -- to wear a face mask while attending Mass indoors. All who want to attend Mass, and who are otherwise vulnerable, should feel safe and welcome inside our sacred spaces. Please use charity and patience with those who do not wish to comply with this strongly stated request. You also might want to consider wearing a face mask for other indoor gatherings, especially for those not yet fully vaccinated. Wearing masks outdoors is not generally required except for activities involving close contact with others who are not fully vaccinated.

Those who are ill, have significant health risk factors or care for someone who is immune-compromised or ill, as well as those who have significant fear or anxiety about contracting the coronavirus in a large group of persons are not obliged to attend Mass.

Pope Francis recently offered a message of hope and unity to the world in an effort to continue increasing confidence in the COVID-19 vaccines, specifically in communities disproportionately affected by the virus. "Thanks to God's grace and to the work of many, we now have vaccines to protect us from COVID-19," the pope said. "Getting the vaccines that are authorized by the respective authorities is an act of love. I pray to God that each one of us can make his or her own small gesture of love; no matter how small, love is always grand."

I am fully vaccinated and recommend the same for my family and friends. In consideration of others, I also am wearing a mask during the distribution of holy Communion and I strongly encourage those distributing holy Communion at Mass to wear a mask while distributing as well.

Remember that the situation seems to be ever changing. This request to wear face masks is temporary and will be changed once this current level of increased coronavirus cases is over. Stay connected to information coming from national, state and local health authorities, and stay home and get tested for COVID when you are not feeling well. Following these recommendations will go a long way in helping to keep you and others around you safe.

We are all tired of this pandemic, but we must not forget that we are called to care for the health of others in times of crisis and must continue to protect our healthcare system and medical workers.

May God bless and watch over us in our time of need.

In the most recent issue of Northeast Ohio Catholic, Bp. Malesic shares the following reflection. Its message is important, and bears repeating. He wrote:

Have you ever had the experience of coming upon a statement of fact so startling as to be almost unbelievable? I did in 2019, when I read a Pew Research Study that revealed that less than one-third of self-identified Catholics expressed a belief in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Since the very dawn of our faith thousands of years ago, the Church has taught that when Jesus said to his apostles at the Last Supper, "This is my body ... this is my blood," he meant it. According to Pew, the majority of Catholics did not believe that "in the most blessed sacrament of the Eucharist, the body and blood, together with the soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, and therefore, the whole of Christ is truly, really and substantially contained." (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1211) Certainly, many factors played a part in this sad reality, but the fact that many baptized Catholics either do not know or do not believe in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist signifies a profound loss that needs to be regained.

The sacrament of the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life and the sacrament to which all other sacraments are oriented. How do we rekindle that knowledge, understanding and love of the Eucharist on which our faith is so deeply connected? I think we must talk and teach about the Eucharist - especially as we prepare for the November meeting of the US Bishops. We need to focus on what the bishops want to do through a Eucharistic Revival and a letter on the Eucharist, which is not meant to focus on any one individual or group of persons, but on our own need for all of us to understand the real presence of Jesus in Eucharist and the communion of faith that our reception of it represents.

The bishops' vision for this multi-year Eucharistic Revival will be aimed at every level of the Church - the parish, the diocese and the nation - and will take the form of a revitalization that will require us to teach the basics of our faith with renewed ardor and methods. My ministry, and the role of every bishop, is to teach clearly and authentically what the Church teaches, including how the sacrament of the Eucharist is administered, prayed, understood and revered and how the faithful are transformed by this sacrament. Watch for more information in these pages and other platforms throughout the diocese on the development of a Eucharistic Revival in the months to come.

A vote by the bishops in June tasked the USCCB Committee on Doctrine to begin drafting a teaching document on the Eucharist. This document is intended to focus on the importance of nurturing an ever-deeper understanding of the beauty and mystery of the Eucharist in our lives. This is not a new topic for our Church. It is central to the teaching of Jesus himself, especially as he proclaimed it in the Gospel of John, Ch 6. The document being drafted by the bishops is not meant to be disciplinary in nature, nor is it targeted at any one individual or class of persons. It is meant for all of us to

contemplate and attempt to assimilate in our lives. It will also include a section on the Church's teaching on the responsibility of every Catholic, including bishops, "to live in accordance with the truth, goodness and beauty of the Eucharist we celebrate."

Jesus said, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." (Jn 6:51). It is my sincere hope that together through the renewal of our teaching and the planned Eucharistic Revival in our diocese, parishes, and larger Church, we will better contemplate and more effectively proclaim the doctrine of the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist through the truth of our teaching, the beauty of our worship and the goodness of a life of service to one another. Please persistently pray for the success of our Eucharistic Revival. I know that God will provide what we need if we ask him.

*A note
from our Pastor*

We are two-thirds of the way through the Year of St. Joseph—which began December 8, 2020 and concludes on December 8, 2021. Pope Francis spoke of why he dedicated this year to St. Joseph in his Apostolic Letter *“Paris Corde.”*

“Now, one hundred and fifty years after his proclamation as Patron of the Catholic Church by Blessed Pius IX (8 December 1870), I would like to share some personal reflections on this extraordinary figure, so close to our own human experience. For, as Jesus says, “out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks” (Mt 12:34). My desire to do so increased during these months of pandemic, when we experienced, amid the crisis, how “our lives are woven together and sustained by ordinary people, people often overlooked. People who do not appear in newspaper and magazine headlines, or on the latest television show, yet in these very days are surely shaping the decisive events of our history. Doctors, nurses, storekeepers and supermarket workers, cleaning personnel, caregivers, transport workers, men and women working to provide essential services and public safety, volunteers, priests, men and women religious, and so very many others. They understood that no one is saved alone... How many people daily exercise patience and offer hope, taking care to spread not panic, but shared responsibility. How many fathers, mothers, grandparents and teachers are showing our children, in small everyday ways, how to accept and deal with a crisis by adjusting their routines, looking ahead and encouraging the practice of prayer. How many are praying, making sacrifices and interceding for the good of all.” Each of us can discover in Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. Saint Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation. A word of recognition and of gratitude is due to them all.”

Meditating on the 7 Joys of St. Joseph is a powerful devotion during this Year of St. Joseph. **The 7 Joys of St. Joseph are:**

1. **The Angel’s Message Of Joy:** “As he considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream. ‘Joseph, son of David,’ the angel said, ‘do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit.’ – Matthew 1:20
2. **The Savior’s Birth:** “But the angel said to them, “Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.” – Luke 2:10-11
3. **Having The Honor Of Naming Jesus:** “...but kept her a virgin until she gave birth to a Son; and he called His name Jesus.” – Matthew 1:25
4. **Knowing The Effects Of Jesus’ Redemptive Work:** “She came along just as Simeon was talking with Mary and Joseph, and she began praising God. She talked about the child to everyone who had been waiting expectantly for God to rescue Jerusalem.” – Luke 2:38
5. **The Idols Of Egypt Fell At Jesus’ Feet:** “A prophecy against Egypt: See, the Lord rides on a swift cloud and is coming to Egypt. The idols of Egypt tremble before him and the hearts of the Egyptians melt with fear.” – Isaiah 19:1
6. **Holy Life With Jesus and Mary:** “When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth.” – Luke 2:39
7. **Finding Jesus After Three Days:** “After three days they found him in the temple courts, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions.” – Luke 2:46

*A note
from our Pastor*

As you read in last weekend's insert, we're participating in the diocesan-wide Heart of a Shepherd campaign ... which will benefit our parish, our seminary, our newly ordained clergy, as well as our

retired clergy.

I'd like to take a few moments this week to speak of our seminary and the process of discernment for the priesthood.

Of the 179 dioceses in the United States, only 30 have their own free-standing seminary. Vocations in the Diocese of Cleveland remain strong, even as national trends show a decline. Currently, there are 71 men in formation at Borromeo Seminary and Saint Mary Seminary, 42 of whom will serve as ordained priests for service in the Diocese of Cleveland. The remaining 29 seminarians are discerning a priestly vocation for service to other religious orders as well as the Dioceses of Youngstown, Daegu South Korea, and Vietnam. Three-thousand men before have been formed for priesthood at our seminaries.

As a nod to the strong culture of vocations in the Diocese of Cleveland, the Georgetown University-based Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) recently recognized Borromeo Seminary and Saint Mary Seminary as having one of the highest percentages of home-grown seminarians in the country.

A PATH TO PRIESTLY FORMATION TAKES NINE YEARS

When a man hears the call of God to the priesthood, his journey often begins with discovery, a conversation with his parish priest, a family member, or a trusted parishioner. Then, with a full heart and persistent desire, he may enter the seminary to discern God's will for his life.

The path of discernment leading to the priesthood can take **nine years**.

Four years at Borromeo Seminary where students study a curriculum of philosophy, science, and the liberal arts, and are assigned an apostolate within the Diocese. College seminarians receive a Bachelor of Arts from John Carroll University.

Five years at Saint Mary Seminary for a graduate theology formation program.

- **Year 1:** Men make a declaration for Candidacy for Holy Orders before the Bishop and are instituted as Acolytes.
- **Year 2:** Seminarians are instituted as Lectors.
- **Year 3:** Seminarians serve in parish internships.
- **Year 4:** Seminarians are ordained deacons and participate in parish life as ordained ministers throughout their final year of study.
- **Year 5:** Seminarians graduate in early May with a Master of Divinity.

from our Pastor*

The diocesan-wide *Heart of a Shepherd* campaign is a four part initiative that is focused on seminary formation of clergy, as well as a means by which to assist the newly ordained, retired clergy, and St. Patrick Parish. The first three parts total a \$30 million initiative; the final part is intended to help St. Patrick Parish with capital improvements—such as, but not limited to: bringing our elevator to up to current code and standards, as well as installing a first-floor handicap accessible restroom. Over the next couple weeks, I'll be delving into a bit of each initiative.

PART I: RENOVATION OUR SEMINARIES
the heart of priestly formation and holistic wellness:
\$20 million

The interior renovation of *Borromeo Seminary* and *Saint Mary Seminary and Graduate School of Theology* is long overdue; the building is over 70 years old.

The holistic formation of priests in our Diocese requires renovations to provide suitable physical space for:

- Liturgical worship, prayer, and reflection
- Fostering formation and human development
- Encouraging relational and vocational growth
- Private study
- Inviting social interactions

Renovations will include modernized student rooms for all students, with individual bathrooms for graduate students, individually controlled heating and cooling, ADA accessible rooms, faculty and guest suite renovations, new furniture, an upgraded elevator and new elevator connecting all floors, common lounge area and study space, laundry rooms, and an updated Reconciliation Chapel.

Resurrection Chapel, a prayerful space where seminarians gather five times a day for prayer and discern their vocation, will also be renovated with a new double door entryway, installation of a Baptismal font, refurbished pews and kneelers, pipe organ restoration, new lighting, and new liturgical furnishings.

This coming Wednesday (Oct 13) and Thursday (Oct 14), we will have two information nights about the *Heart of a Shepherd* campaign→7:30PM each night. It's not too late to RSVP for whichever evening works best with your schedule. The content of both evenings will be identical, as I will address particulars for both St. Pat's and Sacred Heart at each gathering. Also, there'll be a seminarian present who will speak a bit about the seminary component of the campaign.

*A note
from our Pastor*

An IMMENSE Thank You to all who joined us this past week for the information meeting about the diocesan-wide *Heart of a Shepherd* campaign. This endeavor will

not only bring the 1950's era seminary up to 21st century standards—but it will also help both newly ordained clergy, as well as retired diocesan clergy ... including Frs. Reymann and Kraig. Furthermore, 65¢ of every dollar raised, up to our goal of \$44,482.00, will be returned to the parish. And 80¢ of every dollar raised beyond our goal will be returned to the parish. These returned funds will help with needed capital improvement, such as (but not exclusive of):

- Installing a first-floor handicapped restroom, and;
- Bringing our 35 year-old elevator up to current code & standards.

In recent weeks I've highlighted aspects of the seminary renovations that will be funded through the *HOS* campaign. This week I'd like to speak of a bit of how *HOS* will assist retired clergy—as well as St. Patrick Parish.

In our Diocese, we are fortunate to have 258 active priests and 97 retired priests who have dedicated their lives to serving us. Many priests continue to serve our community of faith after retirement, and we are called to do what is necessary to provide them with adequate care. However, the *Retired Clergy Pension Fund (RCPF)* is not yet fully funded, raising a concern that future retired priests will not receive adequate pensions. To ensure proper care for our clergy, while reducing annual premiums for parishes, this initiative will allocate \$7 million to meet this important obligation.

At present, because the *RCPF* is not yet fully funded, each parish is required to make an annual contribution of \$10,000 to the *RCPF* for each priest assigned to the parish; in our case, because I'm shared between two parishes, it's \$5,000 from each parish. By augmenting the fund by \$7 million through the *HOS* campaign, it is envisioned that annual parish contribution will be reduced to \$2,000-to-\$3,000 per priest per year (which would be \$1,000-to-\$1,500 per parish per year given my dual assignment).

*A note
from our Pastor*

Last August, Fr. Mark Latcovich, president-rector of St. Mary and Borromeo Seminaries, spoke at the First Friday Club of Cleveland. The following is part of a

synopsis of his address:

Work on a major renovation project is well underway at the diocesan seminaries on the campus of the Center for Pastoral Leadership. There are five phases to the seven-year campaign: the dream, pre-campaign, the campaign, the 2020 “pause” and renovations.

In the dream phase, Bishop emeritus Anthony Pilla wanted to ensure that the Diocese of Cleveland retained its own seminary. He developed a vision, with consultation from other stakeholders, for a campus that would house formation and ministry training for the entire diocese. The Center for Pastoral Leadership, as it was named, was developed on the campus of Borromeo Seminary in Wickliffe. For a time, Borromeo also was a high school as well as the minor or college seminary. Saint Mary Seminary, the major or graduate seminary, was located on Ansel Road in Cleveland. It moved and shared a campus with Borromeo. Offices for the permanent diaconate, lay ecclesial ministers and continuing education and formation also are housed on the CPL campus.

In 2005, shortly before his retirement, Bishop Pilla approved hiring an architect to plan widening of the seminarians’ residence hall rooms. The late Bishop Richard Lennon, who served the diocese 2006-2016, also supported the project.

The plan was to turn a monastic building into a contemporary one. It called for reducing Borromeo’s 67 cell-like rooms to 35 rooms that would be about 40% larger. On the Saint Mary side, 85 cell-like rooms would be converted to 48 rooms that would be about 60% larger with private bathrooms,

Father Latcovich said the building is solid, but the infrastructure – including plumbing, electrical and heating, ventilation and cooling were outdated and needed work. He recounted times when pipes burst causing damage and fuses would blow cutting electricity to areas of the building. Also, there was no air conditioning and hallways were very narrow.

In 2019, then-Bishop Nelson Perez examined the plans. Father Latcovich described him as “a man of action,” saying that he was “intrigued by the project” and suggested looking at other colleges to ensure the project included needed improvements. Some revisions were made, including eliminating dormitory-style bathrooms so that two rooms would share a bathroom.

*A note
from our Pastor*

Last August, Fr. Mark Latcovich, president-rector of St. Mary and Borromeo Seminaries, spoke at the First Friday Club of Cleveland. The following is a continuation of his address that was published in last weekend's

bulletin:

"There was overwhelming agreement the campaign was needed," Fr. Latcovich said, with a strong majority supporting the Heart of a Shepherd (HOS) and willing to donate. The College of Consultors also approved before Bp. Perez took the next step, seeking approval from the Vatican. That occurred in 2019.

During the campaign phase, materials were prepared and plans arranged to present HOS to a pilot group of parishes. The campaign rolled out in phases, with foundation staff members working with pastors to present HOS to parishioners. Initial results were strong.

Then Bp. Perez was elevated to Archbishop of Philadelphia and soon after, COVID-19 struck so things slowed down during what Fr. Latcovich called "The Pause 2020."

"I was beginning to feel like Moses," Fr. Latcovich quipped, saying he wondered if he'd ever see the project hit the finish line.

HOS continued quietly throughout the pandemic while the diocese was under the guidance of Fr. Don Oleksiak, who served as diocesan administrator until the installation of Bp. Edward Malesic in September 2020. With his approval, some funds on hand were used to upgrade the CPL electrical infrastructure.

Because of the pandemic, Fr. Latcovich said changes were made to the campaign. "We knew that parishes were hurting financially and we needed to find a way to help them. Six options were considered and three were selected that would allow parishes to share in the pledges collected as part of the HOS campaign. "This allowed parishes to get some money for some of their pressing needs," he explained.

The revisions rolled out in fall 2020. HOS has met or exceeded the target goal for each phase of the campaign, Fr. Latcovich said. Of the approximately \$30 million raised, \$8 million will go to parishes. The final fundraising phase is rolling out this fall, the fall of 2021.

The final phase, renovations, is underway. Bp. Malesic used a sledgehammer last November to symbolically begin the demolition phase in the Borromeo wing. Everything was removed to the exterior walls and rooms were reframed in the larger size with shared bathrooms and new lounge space. Fr. Latcovich said state-of-the-art HVAC, electrical, plumbing and safety features are included in the renovations. Fixtures, furniture, flooring, etc. were selected for durability and easy maintenance and cleaning.

Once the Borromeo wing is completed later this fall, the seminarians will move in and work will begin on the Saint Mary wing. When that work begins, some Saint Mary seminarians will be relocated to temporary housing at St. Casmir Parish in Cleveland.

Fr. Latcovich said there is excitement about the project that extends beyond the Diocese of Cleveland. He said the Diocese of Youngstown sends some of its seminarians to Cleveland for formation and education. Bp. David Bonnar recently pledged \$250,000 from the Youngstown Diocese for HOS.

In addition to work at the seminary and assistance to

parishes recovering from the pandemic, HOS has components that will provide funding for the priests' retirement fund and to help recently ordained priests to repay their college debt.

Once construction is completed in about another year, Fr. Latcovich said he anticipates an open house so people from across the diocese can see the finished project. He's also optimistic there will be enough funding to renovate Resurrection Chapel.





*A note
from our Pastor*

Today marks the final weekend that St. Patrick Parish will be actively promoting the *Heart of a Shepherd* campaign. That said, a few parishioners have asked when is the

last day on which they can return their pledge form. Truth-be-told, the diocese will never refuse any pledge, even if the form isn't returned until 2023! So although we ask for all pledges to be returned this week, no future pledge will be refused!

Why are we so quick to complain when something is wrong – and think nothing of it when something is right? Why do we keep mulling over what is wrong and losing our peace, as opposed to mulling over what is right and living in peace? The answer to that question is this: God made us for truth, goodness, and beauty. So when something is true, good, or beautiful we don't notice it because it is as it should be. But when something is false, evil, or ugly we do notice it because it's out of place, and we worry.

This truth begs another question: on what grounds do atheists have to complain? If the atheist believes that all of creation is nothing more than random chance, then why do they think anything is ever out of place? Why do they think that things should be a certain way and get upset when they aren't? If all is chance, then by their logic, atheists have no right to a particular order of things, nor any meaning to anything, nor a right to life itself; so they shouldn't complain, yet they do because they can't escape reality: God is for real, and life (even the atheist's) has meaning and order.

Okay, now do we ever affirm? We know we're complainers about all that is false, evil, and ugly; but do we thank The Creator for all that is true, good, and beautiful? We need to be aware of all that we should be grateful for, and regularly express our gratitude to God and others for it. The Thanksgiving holiday gives us an opportunity every year to do just that, and what a year 2021 has been; in many ways, it's been a continuation of 2020! In spite of all our challenges there are still things to be grateful for and we should acknowledge them; we should be grateful for: God – without Him we wouldn't exist; the Church (which makes God known, how we're supposed to live, and salvation possible); God's love for us; Heaven; our life; our education (ability to read this pastor's column); our health; our families and friends; the roof over our heads; an income and the source of that income; our talents, and; the list goes on and on. So much to be grateful for and at peace about.



*A note
from our Pastor*

It is hard to believe it is the first Sunday of Advent already! It is supposed to be a time of preparing for the coming of the Lord, but sometimes perhaps

we spend more time preparing our homes than our hearts. We spend numerous hours putting up our tree, lights, and decorations and finding the right gift for everyone, but how are we preparing ourselves for the coming of Jesus?

The Gospel today exhorts us to be ready for the coming of our Redeemer at the end of times. Although we may not think of this future reality with great frequency, the Church gives us the season of Advent as a time to take stock of how we are doing, and make anxious preparation for the Savior.

But how are we to do that? In the second reading St. Paul instructs us to conduct ourselves in a manner that is pleasing to God, asking for his grace that our charity might increase; and with an increase of God's love in our hearts, that we might abound in love for one another and for all people. In a special way, then, as we are buying gifts and food to celebrate the feast of the nativity of Christ with our families and friends, perhaps we might also take time this season to act more intentionally in showing love to others, especially those who are less fortunate than we are. This Advent let's be ready to welcome the Lord by spending more time with him in prayer and by looking for Jesus in all of those whom we meet.





Ever since COVID arrived on the scene twenty-one months ago, we've not held any Communal Penance Services. That said, I've regularly mentioned that I've had more confessions during

COVID via the "schedule an appointment" approach than I ever had with established weekly hours for confession.

When we had Communal Penance Services in the past, there was never a problem using the confessionals. In the midst of COVID, however, the confessionals are small enclosed spaces without any source of fresh air—which is problematic when dealing with airborne viruses such as COVID. Thus, we're limited to one sufficiently large space at St. Patrick for confessions (the chapel) and one sufficiently large space at Sacred Heart (the sacristy).


