An overwhelming whirlwind would be a good way to describe this past week. Meeting lots of new people, trying to learn many names, forgetting many of the names I've been told, and attempting to learn as much as I can about St. Patrick's has been exciting. I do ask your understanding when I ask you your name for the 20th time. I'll eventually learn it, but I've found I'm only good with a max of 4 names at a shot.

In chatting with staff, as well as the kids in the PSR program, I've mentioned that I have a dry (some have said warped) sense of humor — with a dash of sarcasm thrown in. I prefer to laugh at issues rather than cry over them. If you ever find yourself wondering: Was Fr. Trask serious, or was he trying to be funny? — chances are significant that it was the latter. With so much to cry about in our world, any opportunity to laugh helps to dispel the tension.

In the coming weeks, I'll be recruiting a cadre of volunteers to help me around the rectory. Most every room is unfurnished, so that makes this an ideal time to "freshen things up." **Are you good with a scraper?** Perhaps we could work together at removing some wallpaper and prepping the walls for a fresh coat of paint. **Any experience with carpentry?** A few accordion-type screens should be replaced with actual hinged doors. **Have an expertise with plumbing?** Perhaps you could help with installing a disposal – and a few other water-related updates. AND, if you're not good with any of the above or just want to walk through the rectory, that can be accomplished as well.

Lent is the ideal time to share in the Sacrament of Confession. I'll be available for the sacrament every morning from 6-8:45. Consider stopping by on your way to work, or after you get the kids off the school. Additionally, I'm available any time by appointment. FYI: General absolution is not permitted except in cases of imminent death, where individual confession is not humanly possible (eg. troops being deployed to an active war zone, etc).



This final day in the octave of Easter has the subtitle: Sunday of Divine Mercy. In Pope Francis' recently published book The Name of God is Mercy he wrote: The more conscious we are of our wretchedness and our sins, the more we experience the love and infinite mercy of God among us, and the more capable we are of looking upon the many 'wounded' we meet along the way with acceptance and mercy. He also offers a counterpoint by saying: Those who are in the habit of judging people from above, who are sure of their own righteousness, who are used to considering themselves just, good, and in the right, don't feel the need to be embraced and forgiven.

One of the best ways to encounter God's mercy is in the Sacrament of Confession. In that sacrament you experience the Lord's tender mercy and, as the pope reflected, When you feel his merciful embrace, when you let vourself be embraced, when you are moved—that's when life can change.

Twice each year we share the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick at Mass with those who desire physical, emotional, psychological and/or spiritual healing. This year, the Sacrament will be shared next weekend.

This Sacrament was once referred to as the Last Rites and you needed one foot in the grave and another on a banana peel before being eligible to receive the Sacrament. During the reforms of the Second Vatican Council, it was determined that the healing touch of Christ should be available to many people - not just the dying. Such as:

- If you're a caregiver and struggle with mental fatigue or emotional exhaustion, the Church would encourage you to participate in the Sacrament.
- If you've been diagnosed with a health issue, it's appropriate that you receive the Sacrament.
- If arthritis, rheumatism, or a fading memory are part of your life experience, you may wish to receive the strength of the Sacrament.

Prayerfully reflect upon your life and, if you feel you'd like to share in this Sacrament, please plan to attend one of these two Masses. (Please note: because the Sacrament will be shared, Mass may last a bit longer than usual.)

We're looking to change bulletin formats in mid-May to 11x17—with a bulletin printed by Dee Printing. There's a major event happening next Sunday. Someone we all know and love is celebrating a birthday. Yep, you guessed it: on 4/17, Fr. Reymann will be 92 years young! Thus far I know I've caught a few people by surprise – and may well continue to do so – when it comes to birthday greetings. No, I'm not a stalker - but I have been known to use technology to my advantage.

Twelve or thirteen years ago I was on retreat and did on retreat what I do every day: I pray for the people of the parish. That which struck me that particular retreat was that, at the time there were nearly 4000 people whom I was pastoring ... and every day all they got was a generic prayer for the people of the parish. Then the Spirit prompted me to a way I could make it a point to pray for people of the parish by name – in a rather systematic way. Everyone has a birthday – and we have that birth information in the computerized parish census records.

Thus, ever since that providential retreat, I have incorporated parishioner birthdays into my daily calendar. Every morning, about 5:30am, Google Calendar sends me a daily agenda ... and at the top are listed parishioners who are celebrating a birthday that day. So, on your birthday, I pray for you by name ... and then pray for everyone else in the parish in a generic way. And if I remember when I see you on the weekend, I may wish you a happy belated birthday ... or, if I have your cell number, I've been known to text greetings on that annual day as well.

Whether I remember to wish you a happy birthday in person – or via text - know that you're prayed for by name on that special (day each year.

And speaking of that special day: 92 years ago today Fr. Reymann was born. Make it a point to join me in praying for him by name on this, his birthday!

On a completely unrelated subject, THANK YOU to all the Lectors and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion who made it a point to be at last Thursday's in-service. Yes, there are some things that we're "changing up" to enable us to better implement some of the recent directives from the Diocese and from Rome.

LITURGY LESSON: THE TABERNACLE

(These lessons will be presented at Mass, but are printed here so you can ponder them after they're offered)

As a youth, when I walked into a church, one of the most immediate experiences by which I knew I was in a Catholic church was the Sanctuary Lamp, burning twenty-four hours a day near the Tabernacle. Every Catholic knew that Our Lord was present in that Tabernacle; we often referred to that presence as "The Blessed Sacrament" – the actual Body and Blood of Christ ... not a symbol or sign, but His actual Body and Blood. When we were before "The Blessed Sacrament," that was a time of solemn prayer. In Churches designed prior to Vatican Council II, the Tabernacle was always on the main altar right in front of the priest as he said Mass with his back to the people.

Believe it or not, for hundreds of years there were no tabernacles in Catholic churches at all. The Blessed Sacrament was kept in the home of the priest (the rectory) so that he could carry it to the sick when necessary. And later, when the tabernacle was moved into the Church it was not put on the main altar but in a side chapel; in virtually all of the great Catholic cathedrals of Europe including St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, the tabernacle is not on the main altar but in a side chapel – although often a chapel nearly as big as a church!

After the Second Vatican Council, the Church said that: the Tabernacle should not be on the main altar, and; it should not distract from the action at the altar. The Church Father's did not want any confusion between the action of the Mass and the reservation of the Blessed Sacrament. Mass is the celebration of Christ **becoming present** to us: in the breaking of His Word, in the celebration of his death and resurrection in the Eucharist, and in the community (the Body of Christ) gathered in prayer. Because the action of the Mass focuses on Christ's **becoming present**, and the Blessed Sacrament is a celebration of Christ who **is present**, the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in a location separate and distinct from where Christ's **becoming present** is celebrated.

Our tabernacle here is unique, as it is 2-sided – with access both from the church & from the chapel – although there is only one light. Perhaps our 2-sided Tabernacle is a good reminder that the reserved Blessed Sacrament has two primary purposes: to be reserved for the sick and dying; and to be in a place for private adoration and prayer.²

LITURGY LESSON: Genuflection

Last week we spoke of the trend, since the Second Vatican Council, to repose the Blessed Sacrament in a Blessed Sacrament Chapel — or at least not front-and-center in the sanctuary. Does that mean that we no longer genuflect when we come into church?

Genuflection is a sign of reverence, and in the case of Catholics, it has always been a sign of reverence and adoration for the Blessed Sacrament — The Blessed Sacrament being the actual Body and Blood of Christ, not a sign or symbol, but his actual body and blood in the form of Bread.

When the Blessed Sacrament is not in the main church, such as is the case at St. Peter's in Rome, the proper form of reverence is to bow to the altar – just as we have always done, for instance, on Good Friday. We bow, or reverence, the altar because it is the place that we celebrate the sacrifice of Jesus; the altar, historically, is a symbol of Christ.

Those of us who went to Catholic Schools back in the forties, fifties or sixties, often went to Mass several times a month. It was easy for our teacher, usually a nun, to practice genuflection with us: going down on the right knee and, often, making the sign of the cross while on that knee. For many reasons that teachable situation isn't present any more. We hope that parents teach their children to bow to the altar if the tabernacle isn't visible and to genuflect to the tabernacle if it is present.

Occasionally there's the question: when do we genuflect on one knee, and when do we genuflect on two knees. Simply put: it's always and only a single knee genuflection. In my early years there was the errant belief that you genuflected on both knees when the Blessed Sacrament was exposed – and only on a single knee when Jesus was in the tabernacle. In June of 1973 Congregation for Divine Worship "Genuflection in the presence of the blessed sacrament, whether reserved in the tabernacle or exposed for public adoration, is on one knee."1 The reason for the continuity between qualities of genuflection is a reminder that the Lord is equally present, whether within or outside the tabernacle.

More important than teaching how to genuflect, is remembering why we genuflect. A religious belief unique to Catholics is belief in the Real Presence of Christ on our altar and in our tabernacle: the Christ who died on the Cross and rose from the dead is the same Christ we receive at communion and who is reserved in the Tabernacle. If we always recall the one whom we are reverencing, then our every bow and genuflection will be an expression of awe and respect for our God.


As you read this, hopefully you've noticed that the speakers have been relocated and that the PA system is working much better. This past Tuesday & Wednesday they spent a good amount of time installing a new wireless microphone (on an approved frequency – the one I'd been using was outlawed in June of 2010 when the frequency was reapportioned to Cellular Phone usage) and then tuned the speakers so they perform optimally.

So, we've not been able to offer both the Body and Blood of Christ at all Masses recently. That's due to only having a relatively small number of available Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. And when that small number is further reduced by work or vacation schedules, the only option is to make do with the ministers available – and that means dropping communion by the cup.

It'd be fantastic to have so many Ushers, Servers, Lectors, Cantors, and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion that ministers only needed to be on one or two times a year. Unfortunately, we're not there yet. And we'll never get to that point if you don't speak up. Not the best speaker? How about serving? Don't feel worthy to distribution Communion? Get in line behind me! None of us is worth, but that doesn't stop the Lord from telling us *I know that, but I still want to use you like I used Peter, James, and John!* Don't have the best voice? Maybe you could serve as usher instead.

Mass was never intended to be a "spectator sport" (for lack of a better analogy). Vatican II calls each Catholic to *full*, *active*, *and conscious participation*. And being involved in a liturgical ministry at Mass is one good way to do just that!

LITURGY LESSON: Principal parts of the Mass

Many of us were raised with the *Baltimore Catechism*, first written in 1942. It said that the Mass was composed of three principal parts: Offertory, Consecration and Communion.³³ Many of us remember that if you missed one of those principal parts of the Mass you had, in effect, missed all of the Mass and had to come to another Mass or risk Mortal Sin for having missed Sunday Mass! Suddenly that definition of the parts of the Mass disappeared after the Second Vatican Council. Why?

The main reason for the change was to restore the Scriptures to their proper role. Christ is as present when the Word is broken as he is when the Eucharist is shared! If the Baltimore Catechism were to be written today, it would say that there are two principal parts, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. A 21st century edition of the Baltimore Catechism would also say that:

- it's important to be prepared for Mass. It would encourage you to arrive a few minutes early so the tensions of the world have a chance to subside; the prelude before Mass seeks to enable this so that, when Mass begins, you're ready to celebrate, to listen attentively, and participate fully.
- Mass begins with the first note of the opening hymn and ends with the final note of the closing hymn.
- One phrase of dismissal at the end of Mass is: "Go, and announce the Gospel of the Lord." And what better place to begin its proclamation and announcement than with those with whom you've just recently worshipped—whether in church, the parking lot, or over breakfast.

Occasionally people express upset that the environment in church is noisy after Mass – but being vocal about Christ is fidelity to the command of the dismissal. Quiet in church before Mass should be the norm – but being expressive of the Christ you experience in Word and Sacrament sometimes needs to be spoken about ... and sometimes spoken loudly.

For the sportsman among us, there are many similarities between Mass and a round of golf – if it's important to arrive before Tee-time to warm up, and if it's encouraged to visit the 19th hole for some refreshment and comradery afterwards – shouldn't the same be true of our praise of God. Preparing ourselves for the celebration, and reflecting upon the celebration, will make the actual celebration more meaningful, more prayerful, and more enjoyable!

There are a great many people who help allow St. Patrick Parish to run like a well-oiled machine. Over the last few months I've noticed a number of things get done without any idea who accomplishes the various tasks. Sometime in mid-to-late April I began asking about the almost always closed Main Street driveway gate: sure, it was always open for weekend Mass – but was closed throughout the week. Apparently this was a rather severe problem before the underpass when traffic would regularly back up to and beyond St. Patrick's. So closing the gate was a wise decision.

With the underpass in place, I question the necessity of leaving the Main Street driveway inaccessible during the week—if for no other reason than a closed gate may well deter visitors. So, from this point forward, we won't close it. And should the former problem of vehicles using the St. Patrick parking lot for a cut-through return, we'll simply close the Adams and Lincoln Street gates during the week.



LITURGY LESSON: Hymnody

One of the great things that happened with liturgical reform of Vatican II was the explosion of new hymns and melodies for the various parts of the Mass. While hymns are not the most important musical parts of the Mass, one of the intentions of the reformers was to have hymns that are: rooted in the Sacred Scriptures; based on the best in music, and; notably different from Pop culture.

If you look at the list of songs in this bulletin, you will find the following hymns. Becky Burkhardt seeks to provide a balance of past and present – from chant to recent compositions:

- ❖ Our ENTRANCE HYMN was "Morning Has Broken" –is a popular and well-known Christian hymn first published in 1931. It has words by English author Eleanor Farjeon and is set to a traditional Scottish Gaelic tune known as "Bunessan" (it shares this tune with the 19th century Christmas Carol "Child in the Manger"
- The GOSPEL ACCLAMATION is based upon a chant melody that was first sung over 1000 years ago.
- ❖ The OFFERTORY HYMN, as well as our RECESSIONAL, is a piece composed in 1992 by Dan Schutte – who has composed liturgical music since the 1970s. Some of his other notable songs include: "Here I Am, Lord," "City of God," and "Glory & Praise to our God" (after which our green hymnal is named).
- The Holy, Holy, Holy that we will shortly sing was composed just four years ago.
- ❖ The COMMUNION HYMN "I am the Bread of Life" was composed by Suzanne Toolan, RSM − a Religious Sister of Mercy. This one song of here has been translated into more than 20 languages!
- As I mentioned the RECESSIONAL is a repeat of the offertory reflection. This is a new song we're learning. Since the offertory may be congregational, but also may be reflective, you're invited to pay close attention to the hymn at offertory, so you'll be familiar enough with it to sing it at the recessional.

Almost thirty years ago the American Bishops said, The quality of joy and enthusiasm which music adds to community worship cannot be gained in any other way. Music imparts a sense of unity to the congregation and sets the appropriate tone for a particular celebration."

When **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion** were first commissioned by Bp. Lennon, there was the understanding that they'd be commissioned for five years – with a single five-year recommissioning. After 10 years of ministry, they'd need to take a hiatus before being again commissioned for that ministry. About 3 years ago, Bp. Lennon recanted on that position and now allows indefinite recommissioning.

That said, Bp. Lennon strongly encourages those fulfilling the ministry of EMHC to participate in continuing education and formation - not unlike any other professional (doctor, lawyer, nurse, teacher, etc) whose license renewal requires a certain number of CEU's (Continuing Education Units).

The diocese is offering an EMHC Enrichment session next week at St. Noel Parish (Willoughy Hills) from 7-9pm on Monday, June 20th, and at St. Sebastian Parish (Akron) from 2-4pm on Tuesday, June 21st. The program will be the same on each day. The speaker will be Fr. Bruce Cinquegrani, pastor of Saint Brigid Parish, Memphis, TN. Fr. Cinquegrani is the Bishop's Vicar for Divine Worship, Spiritual Life, and Catechesis for the Diocese of Memphis and is also Assistant Visiting Professor of Catholic Studies at Christian Brothers University, Memphis. Father Bruce will guide participants in exploring actual liturgical texts to discover the relationship between participation in the liturgy and the effects of the sacraments.

There is no cost associated with attending either session – but they do ask that you register so that they can have sufficient seating available. To register, call the office (440.647.4375) this week.

In the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), which contains the rubrics or rules for celebrating Mass, it indicates that either on the altar or near it, there is to be a cross, with the figure of Christ crucified upon it, a cross clearly visible to the assembled people (par 308). While we do abide by this norm in having the small processional cross in the left of the sanctuary, it would seem like we could do so much better by utilizing what is already at our disposal.

If you've ever visited our chapel, there's a 7-foot tall **crucifix** – which, honestly, is a bit oversized for that space. Relocating that crucifix into our primary worship space would afford everyone to readily focus on a primary symbol of our faith – as well as allow us to better implement the aforementioned prescription of paragraph 308 of the GIRM.

The Lorain County Fair is rapidly approaching. And, as we've done in the past, St. Patrick Parish is looking to host the pizza sub booth. BUT, we can't do it without everyone's help. Are you willing to help others with coordinating the event, or making the pizza subs, or selling at the fair, or with some other component of the fundraiser? A plethora of hands make for light work. LITURGY LESSON: Entrance Procession

Those who are over forty years old will remember when there was no opening procession to begin Mass. The priest and a couple of servers simply walked through a door which connected the sacristy to the sanctuary (altar).

The only time there was an actual procession was when the Bishop came to a parish. When the Bishop, or the Pope, celebrated Mass, there was always In 1963 the Second Vatican Council published the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy and many things began to change. What many of us don't know is that most of the changes instituted by Vatican II were not new; they were simply attempts to reintroduce many very old ways celebrating Mass, including the opening procession. For instance: as far back as 701 A.D. there is record of a procession to begin Mass in Rome.

The entrance procession is not just a way to get the priest to the altar; its purpose is also to gather <u>everyone</u> together – to begin with something unifying – a procession and singing – bringing a sense of joy and setting the theme for the celebration.

Our director of music carefully selects a processional hymn to fit the occasion. Because the processional hymn is meant to unite us in one common voice of praise to God, it doesn't need to end the moment of arrival at the chair; that said, it shouldn't extend beyond that which is necessary to provide us with a sense of unity and joy.


- ❖ 7:00am at Sacred Heart in Oberlin, and;

LITURGY LESSON: Veneration of the Altar

The altar and the ambo (lectern) are meant to be the two architectural focal points of a Catholic Church ... and each is of equal liturgical importance! The altar is the place whereat Christ's Body and Blood become manifest; the ambo is where the Word, spoken by the Father, becomes Flesh once again.

A word about the altar: Historically, the altar has had a central place in any religion that had sacrifice as a principle practice. Also, in religions where a meal was very important, such as the Jewish faith, the table was considered sacred. By the Fourth Century our altar was called "the Table of the Lord." The Catholic altar is a symbol of both actions: it is the place for the reenactment of the sacrifice of Calvary; and; it is the table from which we receive the Body and Blood of Life.

With all of that history and meaning, the altar is regarded as sacred because of what takes place upon it and what it symbolizes. It is reverenced during the entrance procession with a bow by all the ministers and by a kiss from the celebrant.

Prior to Vatican II, altars contained the relics of the martyrs, pieces of bone or cloth associated with a saint who had died for the faith. That practice started centuries ago, probably during the time of persecution when Mass was celebrated in catacombs; in the catacombs, tombs were often used as the altar. Because early Christians celebrated Mass over the tombs of the saints, it was a custom that was embraced for centuries thereafter. Vatican II said that, although this was custom, it no longer required that an altar contain a relic, though ours does.

Why is a relic no longer required? Probably for two reasons: at the time of the Vatican Council there was great concern that relics be authentic, and many were not. But more importantly, the Church did not want to take away from the central meaning of the altar itself, which is our place of sacrifice and our Table of the Lord.

LITURGY LESSON:

The Latin Mass used to begin with a dialogue: "Dominus Vobiscum." The congregation would respond with: "Et cum spiritu tuo." This a greeting that can be dated back to the time of Moses whose "spirit" was shared with the 70 elders: The Lord be with you ... and ... and with the spirit that has been shared with you.

For those who have no understanding of Latin, the dialogue was: "The Lord be with you." and the response was, "And with your spirit." Many times during the old liturgy the priest would say "Dominus vobiscum," and the server would respond, "Et cum spiritu tuo." It is a prayer that "the Lord be with you," not a statement of fact that the Lord is with you. As a part of the Mass it is older than the Sign of the Cross.

Cardinal Bernadine said something interesting about the Sign of the Cross.

The sign of the cross should be made with reverence and attention. By this simple gesture we identify ourselves as Christians. This sign marked us even before baptism and will mark us even after death.1

The Cardinal might have added that the sign of the cross is unique to Catholics. The only other Christians who make this sign are the Orthodox, who make it differently. When we sign ourselves at the end of this liturgy, and as you begin Mass next week, consider whether you consciously make that gesture, or do you just take it for granted? The same can be asked about the Greeting ... which will again be repeated shortly after I place the bread and wine on the altar at the offertory.

Next week we'll continue our discussion of the Sign of the Cross

LITURGY LESSON:

Last week we spoke of the history the Sign of the Cross; today we'll ponder: "Why do we make the sign of the cross from left shoulder to right shoulder, when both Eastern Catholic and Eastern Orthodox make the sign from right shoulder to left?"

Unfortunately, the answer appears to be that no one knows for sure. For the first five or six centuries, the Sign of the Cross was only made over things, like pictures and chalices, and on the forehead. It is unclear when the large, full-body sign of the cross began to be made, possibly not until the time of Pope Leo IV in the ninth century.

Also, the words that we have come to use, "In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," are a late addition. In the Eastern Church they don't say that to this day. The Eastern Sign of the Cross is done this way:

- ❖ First: The thumb and first two fingers are put together. Traditionally, the three extended fingers symbolize the three person of the Holy Trinity; the two tucked fingers symbolize the two natures of Christ (human and divine).
- ❖ Second: the Sign is made on the forehead, breast, right shoulder, left shoulder and then the lips.
- ❖ Third: The Words in the Greek Church are: "Holy God, Holy Strong One, Holy Immortal One, Have mercy on us."

So, are we all more confused? Probably. But what we should come away with is a deep appreciation of the diversity in the Catholic Church. Diversity gives a wonderful richness to our life of Faith.

Our next topic will be the Penitential Rite.

LITURGY LESSON: Penitential Rite

Prior to the liturgical reforms of the Vatican Council, the server had to memorize prayers in the Latin language. The <u>second</u> most difficult was the "Confiteor." This prayer, which the server said quietly on behalf of the entire congregation, was a confession of sins.

When the experts discussed the reforms of the liturgy after the Second Vatican Council, they considered not having a penitential rite because there was only one evidence of it prior to the 8th Century! After much discussion, however, they decided that a simple rite at the beginning of Mass was appropriate.⁸

As Mass begins, the celebrant greets the congregation in words similar to: "My brothers and sisters, to prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us call to mind our sins" During the silence it is not the intention of the Church that we make a long, personal examination of conscience. What the Church wants us to do is to focus on that sinfulness that prevents us from becoming what God wants us to be. As a member of this community, we each make an act of faith that with God's help we can change.

Today, as we began Mass, we used the remnant of the *Confiteor which remains in the new rite*.. Oh, yes, the most difficult Latin prayer the server had to learn was the *Suscipiat*

And as a short digression, not necessarily part of this liturgy lesson, the entire text of the *Suscipiat* is:

Suscipiat Dominus sacrificium de manibus tuis ad laudern et gloriam nominis sui, ad utilitatem quoque nostram totiusque Ecclesiae suae sanctae

Although quite a mouthful in Latin, each week we pray the *Suscipiat* in English; the text of which is:

May the Lord receive the sacrifice from your hands to the praise and glory of his name, for our good and for the good of all his church.

Next week's liturgy lesson will continue our discussion of the Penitential Rite—as we consider another one of the present penitential options.

The second collection today is for **Glenmary Home Missioners**.

LITURGY LESSON: Penitential Act Form C

If you will, the Mass is fundamentally the Bible set to ritual, and one of the goals of 2012 retranslation, called *Liturgiam authenticam*, (Authentic/accurate Liturgy) was to raise this evangelical quality of the Liturgy.

For the last two weeks I've been referring to the Penitential Rite at the beginning of Mass; I've been incorrect: it's properly referred to as the Penitential ACT.

A clear distinction must always be kept between the sacramental absolution received in the Rite of Penance and the ritual absolution performed during the Penitential Act at Mass. The former is the application of Christ's redemptive act to a member of the baptized who is duly contrite for sins and open to receiving God's forgiveness. The latter is a prayer of petition for God's mercy to prepare us for the worthy celebration of the Eucharist. In the Roman Missal of 2012 (which we now use), the latter has a new name. It is now called the Penitential Act instead of Penitential Rite.

The word "rite" is commonly reserved for one of the Sacraments, e.g., the Rite of Baptism, the Rite of Marriage, etc. The use of the word "act", on the other hand, refers to a step or action that is a part of something larger. Our communal "action" of acknowledging our sinful state is the first step toward thankfulness for God's mercy, which is always greater than our sinfulness. The pattern of the liturgy is a pattern for life: acknowledge one's sinfulness, but then move on to acceptance of and gratitude for God's merciful love.

Today's discussion of the Penitential Act references what is known as "form C" – where there are three tropes – to which the congregation responds Lord, Have Mercy – Christ, Have Mercy – Lord, Have Mercy.

In each of the tropes, there's a reference to the scriptures as to why we feel comfortable approaching the Lord for Mercy. One suggested set of tropes is:

- You were sent to heal the contrite of heart...
- You came to call sinners...
- You are seated at the right hand of the Father to intercede for us...

These tropes are rooted in:

- "[The Lord] heals the brokenhearted; He binds up all their wounds" (Ps 147:3).
- "Go and learn the meaning of the words, 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' I did not come to call the righteous but sinners" (Mt 9:13).
- "Who will condemn? It is Christ (Jesus) who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us" (Rom 8:34).

There are 8 different suggested tropes in the Roman Missal. But the Roman Missal also states: "The priest, or a deacon or another minister, then says the following or other invocations with Kyrie, eleison (Lord/Christ, have mercy)." The chanting or recitation of the Kyrie tropes is not limited to the priest or the deacon. Another minister — for example, a cantor — may chant the tropes to enhance the liturgy.

Secondly, the three tropes provided in the Order of Mass, as well as the other sets provided in Appendix VI of the Missal, are only given as samples. The priest celebrant or other minister is encouraged to create tropes which could be inspired by the liturgical observance or the scriptures of the day or the particular needs of the local Church.

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LITURGY LESSON: Asperges

Two weeks ago we spoke of the Confiteor (I confess to Almighty God...), and last week I spoke of the scriptural basis to Penitential Act "C". Today, I spoke of an optional penitential act called the *Asperges* - which is a Latin word meaning Sprinkling. As Mass began, I blessed some water and sprinkled you with it. This rite seems to have originated in monasteries in the eighth century where a procession moved through the cloister, and each room was sprinkled, as a sign of cleansing."

By the Middle Ages, the rite was celebrated before the principal Mass in parish churches. It progressively took on a baptismal character and served as a reminder of the life-giving waters of baptism. Eventually it became an optional rite in the Roman Rite, and now it may be used as the Penitential Act.

The act of sprinkling may be used at any Mass, but is especially appropriate during the Easter season when we recall the new life we share through our Baptism.

The appropriate response to being sprinkled is not to duck away from the water, but to bow and make the sign of the cross – for it was in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit that you were baptized. And, since it was through the water of baptism that we received the possibility of eternal life – we ought be honored to be drenched with that which once cleansed us of our sins.

While there are many things to be covered in the liturgy lessons, I'm sure there are several elements incidental to Mass that probably won't be addressed. One of those incidentals is: *How is one chosen/selected to bring up the offertory gifts?*

Actually, the Lector at Mass is tasked with approaching a family, or 2 individuals, to bring forward the gifts. But you do not need to *wait to be asked*; you're more than welcome, and actually you're encouraged, to volunteer to bring up the offertory gifts. And you can do this in one of several ways:

- You may call the rectory office (647-4375) to indicate the date and Mass time you'd like to bring up the gifts. (You may also do this via email by directing it to secretary@stpatrickwellington.com)
- You're also welcome to approach the Lector in the sacristy before Mass. Just be aware that.

In several weeks, when we get to the liturgy lesson about the offertory, I'll discuss the symbolism of the offertory gifts—and why it's appropriate that several members of the congregation actually present the gifts.

Earlier this month St. Patrick Parish received another distribution check from the *Rooted In Faith-Forward in Hope* capital campaign; this \$1763 check brings the total we've received in asset sharings to \$73,008.

These *RIF-FIH* distributions are deposited into the parish general fund.

THANKS to everyone who is part of this diocesan effort to help nurture and foster a strong Catholic presence in the Diocese of Cleveland for many years to come.

As you may recall, the *RIF-FIH* campaign offered donors a full five years in which to fulfill their pledge. And many are making monthly, quarterly, semi-annual, or annual gifts in fulfillment of those pledges; others paid it all up front, and still others will fulfill their entire pledge at the end.

At a recent *Parish Finance Council* meeting, one member said their monthly *RIF-FIH* pledge payment is now a regularly budgeted expense. But when the pledge is fulfilled, they'll be designating those funds to St. Patrick's *for parish use only* (such a designation means that 100% of the donation remains at St. Patrick Parish; nothing is assessed by the diocese or shared elsewhere). I was grateful for the council member's suggestion and thought I'd share it with you—in hopes that others might consider doing similarly.

LITURGY LESSON: Gloria

In the very early church this was a hymn, composed by someone unknown, that incorporated many lines from the Bible. The first lines are taken from St. Luke and are a variation of the words spoken by the angels to the shepherds at the birth of Christ, "Glory to God in the Highest, and peace to His people on earth." 1

The "Glory to God" is not sung or said at Mass during Advent or Lent. This is not to imply that the church does not give glory to God these liturgical seasons. The church, rather, uses our senses to create a different atmosphere during different seasons. In Lent the purple vestments, the austere environment, and the simpler music convey a penitential setting; in Easter, the bright vestment, festive environment, the Gloria and upbeat hymns convey celebratory attitude.

The GLORIA was probably first sung at an Easter sunrise Mass in a Church in Syria or Greece. By the sixth century it was part of the Pope's Christmas Mass. By the eleventh century it was sung on all Sundays and Feast Days in the western church. It has been a part of our tradition of worship ever since.

Next week, our liturgy lesson will discuss the Opening Prayer.

LITURGY LESSON: The Opening Prayer

.Immediately following the Glory to God, the celebrant addresses the congregation and says, "Let us pray." There is a moment of silence and then the celebrant offers a prayer. Sounds simple, doesn't it? However, this prayer is one of the most ancient and most important in our liturgy. It was really lost in the pre--Vatican Council celebrations of Mass, but the postconciliar liturgy has restored this prayer to its importance. There is a different prayer for every Sunday, and the Church has incorporated prayers from many ancient traditions, including the Eastern Church. Why is it so important?

Remember ancient Gaul? That's the country Julius Caesar conquered in the Gallic Wars. Gaul became a very strong area for the Catholic faith, and by the fifth century in Gaul this prayer "Collecta" became known as and subsequently adopted by the rest of the Church.14 In our Roman Missal it is still called "The Collect."

Although the pause between "Let us pray" and "The Collect" does afford the server an opportunity to bring the celebrant the book ... it's a time when you're supposed to be identifying the personal needs and/or petitions that you bring to Mass. When the celebrant prays the opening prayer, he is "collecting" or "gathering together" everyone's personal needs and/or petitions - hence, the name "The Collect."

The liturgy lessons will skip a week next week, as we welcome our missionary; they'll continue the weekend of August 20/21 with a final reflection upon the opening rites of the Mass.

I've always been a big one for praying for the deceased. Hopefully our prayers will get them through the "pearly gates" and then, hopefully, their prayers will do the same for us.


When it comes to praying for the deceased during the general intercessions at Mass, I like to include the recently deceased in the petitions. That said, where does one draw the line? I mean, I've been to parishes where the intercessions go on forever as they pray for *Eunice*, the 3rd cousin twice removed of Elmer Somebody.

I think it's important to limit the names of the recently deceased we pray for to immediate family: a parent, asibling, or a child. If the funeral is scheduled for St. Patrick's, we'll know to include the deceased in the general intercession. If, on the other hand, an immediate relative passes whose funeral will be celebrated elsewhere, please call the rectory to ask that we pray for the recently deceased at Mass..

Well, father, what about more distant relatives? There's an easy answer here. Call the rectory office in those situations. Although we won't pray for them by name in the general intercessions—we'll add them to the RIP prayer list that hangs in the foyers.

And, just as an FYI, Mass intentions may be for anyone. The above only applies to the recently deceased, whose (Continued on page 2)

Monday, Aug 15th, is the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary. BUT, because the Holy Day falls on a Monday, it is not obligatory. Thus, although it's still a Holy Day, it is **NOT a Holy Day of obligation** in 2016.

How do I know if a holy day is obligatory? Except for December Holy Days (Immaculate Conception on 12/8 and Christmas on12/25) which are both always obligatory, when a Holy Day falls on a Monday or Saturday, it's not obligatory.

Occasionally people will inquire as to why a "next of kin" is requested for those living alone. Actually, there's a logical explanation for that...

About 12 years ago several parishioners approached me after morning Mass and said: Hey, Father, did you hear that Helen is in the hospital? Now Helen was a daily Mass communicant, and I'd noted her absence. But when I asked these inquiring parishioners the hospital at which Helen was a patient—no one had any idea. The secretary dutifully called all the hospitals on the east side of Cleveland, as well as in Akron and downtown Cleveland. But no one could offer any insights as to Helen's whereabouts.

A little more than a month later I received a phone call from Helen's daughter telling me that her mother was still a patient at a far west side hospital. She knew it was a far distance to travel, but could I at least call her mother and let her know that I and the parish were praying for her?

I assured Helen's daughter that I'd call. But I also told her all that we'd gone through in trying to locate her mother the prior month. And then I asked her the daughter for her cell number so that, if Helen ever went into the hospital again, I'd at least know who to call for an update.

For the last 12 years I've made it a point to ask for a next-of-kin contact for those who live alone. I hope never to need to dial ones next-of-kin ... but those numbers sure are nice to have when I've exhausted all other means of contacting an otherwise unreachable sick or injured parishioner.

LITURGY LESSON: Reflection on the opening rites

We have been presenting these Liturgy Lessons since May, and have now completed the Opening Rites of the Mass. Next week we will begin the Liturgy of the Word.

Joseph Cardinal Bernadin, the former Cardinal archbishop of Chicago, was writing a pastoral letter on the liturgy when he died of pancreatic cancer in 1997. His reflections, upon the portion of Liturgy we have just finished explaining, are these:

Everything that happens before the first scripture reading is meant to help us assemble. That means gathering together many individuals as one community at prayer, but it also means recollecting ourselves personally - not by leaving behind the cares and distractions of home and work – but by bringing them into the Gospel's light.

So we gather, one by one, household-by-household, passing through the doors of this parish church of ours, greeting one another and taking our places. This building called a *church* is a kind of living room of the family of God – it is our room when we assemble as the church. Here we are at home.

(But that living room, that church,) can only invite us to come together and pray together. That invitation must be accepted. Certainly there are times for praying alone, seeking privacy, but the Sunday Liturgy is not one of these. The first task of each one who comes on Sunday is to take the open place nearest the holy table. Let our churches fill from the front to the back.... If we gather as we ought – singing together, being silent together, responding together – we will be a community praying, and know that we are such.'

Two weeks ago when I put the teaser out about the 8 changes I'd made (which was actually moving 8 of the 14 stations), I was amazed at the "lists of 8" that people would recite – and then ask: did I get all 8? Some of what they elicited truly were changes I'd made (apart from moving the stations); other items on their list had always been there (eg. the candles on the back walls of the church) but had only recently been noticed.

Listening to the "lists of 8" I came to realize I've not been too good at following the unwritten rule of: A new pastor observes for a year before making any changes. At times, these pastoral words of wisdom make sense — and at times they're more of a detriment than a benefit. Personally, I'm aiming for a healthy balance: waiting on that which can wait, but acting on that which really shouldn't wait.

Speaking of one of those things that really shouldn't wait – you may have noticed a new baptismal font on the left side of the sanctuary. While not a brand new font (it was obtained from a parish that was renovating their sanctuary), it is new to us.

Why move on a baptismal font now, rather than waiting until after a year? Firstly, the font is the means through which individuals (often infants, but adults as well) become Catholic. Rather than being moved into and out of the worship space as needed, the font really ought to have a prominent place in the worship space.

To better appreciate this second reason for *why now* you need to understand my unusual (sometimes strange) sense of humor. Shortly after I arrived at St. Patrick's I asked Maria (the custodian) where I might find the baptismal font – since I couldn't locate it. She brought me into the chapel and pointed toward a stand I'd previously noticed – but never considered to be a baptismal font. I looked at the baptismal stand, and the small dish on the top, and commented to Maria: *I pour more water than that thing can hold!* (you're supposed to laugh at that).


Seriously, though, the water used at baptism symbolizes the washing away of sin and a relationship with Christ that will last for all eternity! The water used in this sacrament is an important symbol and should be used generously—and I do.

The third and final reason for *why now* is immensely practical – it was available. But if I waited out the remainder of the year, another other parish might've acquired it.

When it comes to any changes surrounding Mass or our worship space, there's generally a very practical reason behind any of them — whether those that've taken place over the last six months, or whatever might change in the future.

Sometimes I'm good at sharing the rationale about changes, at times I presume the reason is obvious so don't think to say anything, and at other times it completely slips my mind. Bottom line is: if you don't know, but want to know, ask. I'm more than happy to share the rationale behind things/changes, and your query may give me another topic for a future reflection article.

LITURGY LESSON: Our Posture at Prayer

Following the opening prayer, the posture of the congregation changes. And will, on average, do so another 14 times during the Mass. We sit 4 times, stand 7 times, bow once, and kneel three times. None of those motions take place arbitrarily.

Standing, which we've done since the start of the opening hymn, is a posture of prayer and reverence. The early Christians would stand as a symbolic reference to the Resurrection. We stood as Mass began to reverence Christ among us in His Body and remained standing as we began our prayer; we'll stand again to reverence Christ in his Gospel – as well as several times thereafter.

But now we're seated – and we sat for a purpose. Sitting is a posture of learning. At the time of Jesus, it was customary for students and teachers to sit. In Luke 4:20-21 we see that even Jesus sat to teach: Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them, "Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." On the occasions when Jesus fed the 4000 and the 5000, they were instructed to sit – so they could learn.

If we stand to give reverence and to pray, and we sit to learn, why do we kneel? Psalm 95:6-7 reads "Come, then, let us bow down and worship, bending the knee before the Lord, our maker. For he is our God and we are his people, the flock he shepherds."

Kneeling, although of thought of as a posture of prayer and reverence, is historically also a posture of supplication (begging). Matthew, Mark, Acts, Romans, Ephesians, and Philippians all make reference to bending the knee in humility before the Lord ... and there are many Old Testament references to kneeling as well. This posture of supplication is one that has been assumed by Christians and Jews for centuries.

Next week our Liturgy Lesson will talk of the composition of the Lectionary (the book from which the Lector reads the reading); the week thereafter we'll speak about the role of reader (or Lector) at Mass.

The recent storms in

Louisiana have caused the worst flooding since Hurricane Katrina. Across large portions of LA as many as 60,000 homes have been damaged & more than 106,000 individuals & families have sought federal disaster aid.

LITURGY LESSON: The Lectionary

The Lectionary is the book from which the lector (reader) proclaims the scriptures. In every liturgical season except the Easter Season, the first reading at Mass is taken from the Hebrew Scriptures and the second reading is taken from the Christian Scriptures. Though most Catholics refer to the Hebrew Scriptures as the Old Testament and the Christian Scriptures as the New Testament – using the terms Hebrew and Christian Scriptures shows greater respect to the Jewish people, who are our older brothers and sisters in the faith.

The Book of the Gospels is a book separate and distinct from the Lectionary. The Book of the Gospels contains only the Gospels. Although every text of scripture is God's Word, the Book of the Gospels is given heightened respect because it is the Word of Father shared with us by Jesus Christ

The Sunday readings are chosen on a three-year cycle; today's readings won't be repeated until 2019. On Feasts, such as All Saints Day, All Souls Day, etc., the readings are selected by the church to fit a particular feast. However, during what is called The Season of Ordinary Time, we often read somewhat continuously from the same book. For the remainder of Ordinary Time in 2016 we will read only from the Gospel of Luke. If you were to attend weekday and Sunday Mass every day from now until 2019, you would have heard approximately 90% of the Bible.

Lastly, until this past March (shortly after I arrived at St. Patrick's) we always carried the Lectionary into and out of church. The reason we changed this is that the Book of the Gospels (not the Lectionary) is to be carried into church in procession. Once the Gospel is proclaimed, we become the bearers of the Word. At the end of Mass the Book of the Gospels remains in church as a reminder to us that we must carry into the world that which has been proclaimed to us.

In the last 12-15 years, there have been a number of liturgical documents intended to help focus the faithful on the Mass ... as well as to curb some of the liturgical abuses or aberrations that had crept in over the years.

Two of the more notable documents are: Redemptoris Sacramentum (On certain matters to be observed or to be avoided regarding the Most Holy Eucharist), which was released in 2004, and the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, which was released in 2012 when we began using the new translation at Mass.

One particular specification in Redemptoris Sacramentum is found in paragraph 117 where it says we may not use vessels (eg. chalices or patens) made from glass, earthenware, clay, or other materials that break easily. This norm is to be applied even as regards metals and other materials that easily rust or deteriorate.

This impacts us here at St. Patrick Parish because we have heretofore used crystal chalices to distribute the Blood of Christ at weekend Mass. We will be transitioning to vessels that are semiprecious in nature.

In all honesty, I believe the emphasis of Redemptoris Sacramentum is laudable and is intended to heighten our awareness of, and appreciation for, the Body and Blood of Christ. Two thoughts come to mind:

When you go out for dinner, you drink wine from glassware or crystal. In fact, you may have wine glasses at home which resemble those we have at St. Patrick. The subliminal message, when you drink the same flavored liquid in the same type of crystal, is to think that it's the same thing that you have with dinner: wine. And you couldn't be MORE WRONG! What is shared at communion is the Body and Blood of Christ. What may look like wine and taste like wine, is the furthest thing from wine. It is the body and blood, soul and divinity of the Son of God.


The Church, through Redemptoris Sacramentum is calling us to use markedly different vessels at communion to visibly remind us that what we partake of at communion is markedly different from anything else we've ever received.

In 30+ years as a priest, I've never seen a chalice dropped. But that's not to say it's never happened. In fact, I've known it to happen - but, gratefully, never when I've been present. When a chalice hits the floor, the Blood of Christ is spread farand-wide – and which needs to be reverently cleaned up. But if that chalice is glass/crystal and shatters when it hits the floor, you now have knifelike shards of glass/crystal mixed in with the Blood of Christ. How does one reverently extract the Blood of Christ from the carpet without simultaneously cutting themselves? I mean, even if you're ultra-diligent, fine shards still remain and can do significant damage.

Gold plated chalices are not inexpensive (well, there are some cheap ones – but in those cases you only get what you pay for). That said, I did acquire some hand-me-down chalices for us to use as we transition from crystal to metal chalices for distribution of the Blood of Christ. Eventually, when finances allow, perhaps we'll acquire some of our own.

LITURGY LESSON: The role of reader/lector

Those who are united by their common baptism, and who have not been called to the ordained ministry of bishop, priest or deacon, are called "The People of God." Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the frequently used term was "The Laity" or "Lay People." Though the distinction still remains, and is an important one, the Constitution on the Liturgy insisted that the laity (The People of God) also have a "priestly role." Listen to this quote from the Constitution:

It is very much the wish of the church that all the faithful should take that full, conscious, and active part in liturgical celebrations which is demanded by the very nature of the liturgy, and to which the Christian people, "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a redeemed people" have a right and to which they are bound by reason of their Baptism. 37

That is why lay people have been asked to play significant roles in the Liturgy. One of those is the role of READER or LECTOR. There are 12 Readers at St. Patrick Parish; today's lector was [5p: Patty Sumpter – 8:30a: Vickie Paulin – 11a: Jaclyn Stocking] and she proclaimed God's word to us. The role of lector is not the role of the priest or deacon, and it is a privilege that St. Patrick lectors do not take lightly. That same Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy says, "God is present in his word since it is He himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in Church." So each Lector has received a workbook that gives background to the scriptural text and assists the Lector in preparing the reading for Mass.

Whereas, as priest, I have been given the awesome responsibility and privilege of enabling the elements of bread and wine to become the Body and Blood of Christ, the Lector has been given the awesome responsibility and privilege of enabling the printed word to, when proclaimed, become flesh! Because it is in its proclamation that the Word becomes Flesh, it is important that the Lector properly prepare. It is also important for each of us to LISTEN to God's Word. Although hymnals are available for those who have difficulty hearing, God's Word speaks to us in the proclamation, not our reading of it. "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was made flesh and dwells among us"

St. Patrick's is hosting the **Wellington Senior Luncheon** on Wednesday, September 14th.

For one who never enjoyed reading growing up, I thoroughly enjoy it now. And I like reading on an e-reader since I'm generally working through 4-5 books at any one time.

One of my current reads is "Between Heaven and Mirth: Why Joy, Humor, and Laughter Are at the Heart of the Spiritual Life" by Fr. James Martin, SJ. This book, as well as most of his other writings, are valuable assets to augmenting one's spiritual life. To that end, I'd like to share with you a few excerpts from his book:

"Humor and community are intimately linked. In an intuitive way, we get the feeling that jokes are best enjoyed in the company of friends. We tell them at school, at work, at the bar, and at home. They demonstrate intimacy, trust, and a sense of togetherness among those who both tell jokes and listen to them. Thus one of the most important elements of humor is the intimate connection it fosters among the members of a community. Through jokes we also show our affection for the people who are most important in our lives. By joking with other people we are, in effect, taking care of them and simultaneously telling them that we love them. And by inviting more people to share the same joke, our community expands and becomes more open to the presence of others.

Jokes affirm a group's identity and, at the same time, make that community far richer by attracting new members. Yet the importance of humor extends farther. Jokes and humor may also be viewed as evidence of the changes that occur in the community over time. They point to a shared history, a common past that consists of a litany of dangers, trials, and occasional bouts of real suffering and genuine hardship. Humor does more than simply "smooth over" or "take the edge off" these rough times. It literally reverses the sentiment of despair into its opposite: hope. Humor thus performs the Janus-like task of looking backwards and forwards in time. It recalls the past, and it sets it squarely before our gaze. Yet humor, the language of hope and joy, turns our eyes even more resolutely toward the future. By telling a joke we affirm that our relationships are vitally healthy and ongoing, and thus open to change, to further development, to continual deepening—in short, jokes open our lives and our communities to God."

"JOY, HUMOR, AND LAUGHTER should be part of everyone's spiritual life. They are gifts from God and help us (Continued on page 2)

enjoy creation. "A good laugh is a sign of love," said Karl Rahner. "It may be said to give us a glimpse of, or a first lesson in, the love that God bears for every one of us.""

John Gottman, a psychologist "who specializes in marriage and parenting, notes that for couples who are married for more than seven years, the most consistent predictor of divorce is the absence of laughter. "Our marriages are only as good as our histories of laughter together."

The Rev. James Martin, S.J., is a Jesuit priest, author and editor at large at America, the national Catholic magazine. His most recent books are "Seven Words," "Jesus: The Abbey" and Pilgrimage." (HarperOne). Among his other books, The Jesuit Guide to (Almost) Everything: A Spirituality for Real Life, a New York Times bestseller, was awarded a 2010 Christopher Award, and was also a number one bestseller in Catholic books. Hardly a day goes by that there's not some story in the media about a heroin-related death. It's a national epidemic ... and Wellington is not immune! While you might not be able to change things on the national level, you can do something locally.

To that end, you may have heard of South Lorain County LINC (Local Initiative to Network Compassion). Spearheaded by Wellington's Police Chief, Tim Barfield, LINC is intended to be an area wide cooperative to help the addict who wants help to get help. And it's already been instrumental in getting several addicts into recovery programs. But, in order for the program to be truly successful, it needs a lot more volunteers ... which is where you come in.

When an addict comes to the police department* and says: *I'm a drug addict and I need help* LINC jumps into action. And with LINC the response is multi-faceted. In one facet, the emergency services personnel work diligently to locate a recovery program to accept the addict who wants help. But another critical facet is that the addict, who desires



recovery, not be left alone. If left alone, the addict may rethink their decision — and walk away from potential recovery. In fact, there's nothing to keep the addict from walking away** ... which is why you (aka, the yet-to-be-

trained volunteer) are such an important component of LINC's success.

LINC needs a much larger cadre of area volunteers who can commit themselves to being on-call for a period of time each month, in case an addict approaches them for help. Should an addict come in when you're on call, you'd be called and would remain with the addict until emergency personnel are able to identify a recovery program that will accept them. During the hour-or-so that it takes to find a program, the addict may begin to question the wisdom of seeking help. You, as a trained volunteer (yes, you'll receive training so you know what is most helpful to say and/or do), would try to affirm their decision to seek help and overcome their addiction. If desired, you might pray with the nervous addict.

As a volunteer, personal safety should not be a concern. Because addicts approach emergency services for help with (Continued on page 2)

recovery, you'd most likely be spending that hour-orso with the addict at the police department. And if that's not a safe environment, we're all in trouble! ;-)

Drug addiction, especially heroin addiction, is wicked and prevalent – even here in Wellington. If you'd like more information on how you can become a vital part of the LINC initiative as a volunteer who would be available to encourage an addict desirous of recovery, please contact me at 440.987.9873.

* You may think it strange that anyone would come into a police department and admit to having a problem with heroin, but many have done so in localities that have similar initiatives. (The Lodi, OH PD has had a similar program for nearly a year, and can hardly keep up with the addicts approaching it for help!)

**As long as the addict is not in possession of illegal substances (eg. heroin, etc) when they come into the police department, no crime has been committed – so they can't be arrested for their admission and desire for help.

St. Patrick Parish WELLINGTON, OH

You may have noticed that, for more than 6 months, we've not printed the lyrics to any songs in the weekly bulletin. And there's a simple reason for that. It's illegal to print lyrics/words without first obtaining copyright permissions – something we've never secured. This means that, if we continued to print the lyrics and were caught, we'd face some pretty hefty fines. The fines are intentionally high for the purposes of encouraging doing things legally in the first place.

Why were we printing the lyrics of various hymns/ songs? Our green Glory & Praise hymnals are 18 years old, and the red Worship II hymnals are 15 years old. In the intervening years, much new music has been composed - and there's been a desire to include that richness in our weekend liturgies. But we're not able to legitimately use those compositions unless we first secure the proper licenses.

At my request, Becky looked into what it would cost to secure a reprint license for the songs we've previously printed. Her finding: ~\$300-350 per year per publisher. Which means if we wanted to use five different songs from five different publishers, we'd be paying in excess of \$1500/year for the privilege of reprinting the lyrics to those songs. Can you say sticker shock?!

In an attempt to enable us to utilize more contemporary hymnody, while also retaining the rich treasury of ancient hymnody from our Catholic tradition, we will be transitioning from the present complement of Glory & Praise and Worship II hymnals to a single Breaking Bread hymnal. The Breaking Bread hymnal includes most every hymn or song that Becky has previously printed in the bulletin. Additionally, it's the large print edition (which I'll appreciate – and I hope you do, too), and it includes the Sunday readings - and the musical notation for the psalm response will routinely match what we're singing; currently it does so with great infrequency.

What will happen to the Glory & Praise and Worship II hymnals once we transition to Breaking Bread? Firstly, we're not there yet - so please leave them in the pew! But, in all likelihood, they'll be offered to anyone... in exchange for whatever donation they'd like to make. More on that once the Breaking Bread hymnals have arrived.

LITURGY LESSON: The Crucifix vs. the Risen Christ

When I first entered Borromeo Seminary in the fall of 1977, featured prominently in the seminary chapel was the image of the resurrected Christ on a cross. Several years later, when the chapel was renovated and the resurrected Christ was replaced with a crucifix, there was a very vocal outcry ... until we discovered the theology behind the change.

The resurrection is an expression of how deeply the Father loves His Son. Yet, the Lord's three years of public ministry were a constant and continual expression of how deeply the Son loves

There isn't anything that Jesus wouldn't do for us. He healed the sick, He forgave sinners, He even raised Lazarus from the dead. In every Gospel we read, we're reminded of this. And when we gather around the altar to celebrate the Eucharist, we're again reminded of the totality of Jesus' love for each of us ... "this is my body" ... "this is my blood" ... "which will be shed for you" ... "do this in memory of me." All this, and far more, is conveyed by Ωf

It took me a while to fully appreciate the importance of a crucifix, instead of the resurrected Christ, in the seminary chapel. But I can honestly say I don't miss the resurrected Christ each time I enter the Borromeo chapel (which is something that still regularly happens. I am spiritual director for several seminarians and go there often - so they don't all have to drive to Wellington).

Each time I ponder Jesus on the crucifix, I am mindful that His love for me is unconditional. Despite my ongoing sinfulness and weaknesses, the crucifix continually reminds me that I can approach the Son of God for forgiveness because there's nothing do

So, when you find your tongue has gotten you into trouble (whether with a spouse, a parent, co-worker, friend, etc.) ... spend some time before the crucifix. If you're struggling to overcome an addiction (perhaps to alcohol, drugs, pornography, over-indulgence, etc.) spend some time pondering the fact that Jesus loves you unconditionally, despite your addiction, and you overcome stop at nothing to help

The more we grow in our awareness of the fact that there's nothing that Jesus won't do for us ... the more we'll want follow in his example. Imagine how different our world would be, and Wellington can be, if we embody the same quality of unconditional love we witness every time we gaze upon the cross.

Early voting begins on Wednesday. Thus it seems wise to share with you some comments from Bp. Lennon. The bishop's full text, initially released on 2 September 2016, is available on the diocesan website (http://www.dioceseofcleveland.org).

In November 1952, Flannery O'Conner commented in a letter to Sally Fitzgerald, "My mamma and I are on the way to the polls to cancel out each other's vote."

Usually it takes another person to cancel one's vote. However, sometimes Catholics are faced with a choice between two or more candidates whose policies do not fully reflect Catholic teachings or who seem to lack the gifts of leadership. In such cases, Catholics feel like their votes may already have been canceled out. What is a Catholic voter to do?

The bishops of the United States once again have offered principles to help Catholic voters. Let me direct you to some of the more helpful sections of "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship – A Call to Political Responsibility" from the Catholic bishops as they pertain to this year's election.


Voters will need to employ the virtue of prudence in a major way this year. "Doing the prudent thing" often may seem to be associated with weaseling out of one's responsibilities or making excuses to do what one knows is wrong. However, the positive notion of prudence, on the other hand, suggests the ability to deliberate over the available choices (#19). What choice is most fitting? Which would do the least harm, or do the most good, in a specific area?

One must also be aware of the gradation of evils. Not all sins are equally serious. Sometimes sinful actions can be excused, given certain circumstances. Other sinful actions are by nature intrinsically evil. No circumstances can excuse those sins. Sometimes people make no ethical distinctions at all, leading them to dismiss a candidate's position on very serious issues because the candidate is right on a host of lesser issues. On the other hand, some people focus on one very important issue and treat all others as of no account. These "one-issue" voters need to consider the total picture.

With some effort, voters can become knowledgeable and discerning on the various issues. Often enough, the answers to issues may become clear. But voting on candidates is much more complex. A candidate might propose one policy one day, and a different policy on another day (or before another audience). What to do?

Again, the virtue of prudence comes to the fore. Voters need to make judgments based on "the art of the possible." (#32) If one chooses among the candidates in order to advance a candidate's illegitimate agenda, such a vote would be immoral. (#34) In order for one to legitimately vote for a candidate whose policies promote an intrinsic evil, one must have "morally grave reasons" to justify doing so. (#34) If such morally grave reasons exist and one does not choose a candidate with the purpose of supporting an intrinsic evil, the ill effects of one's vote are unintended side effects and one can cast such a vote with integrity. It is essential, however, that voters be guided by a well-formed conscience that recognizes that all issues do not carry the same moral weight and that the moral obligation to oppose policies promoting intrinsically evil acts has a

special claim on our consciences and our actions. (#37)

Sometimes, however, voters may face a choice among candidates who all have adopted policies supporting an intrinsic evil. In such a case, the voter must ask, "Which will be more likely to pursue other authentic human goods?" (#36) Voters will therefore have to consider the likely effects of voting for one candidate over another and take into account a candidate's commitments, character, integrity and ability to influence a given issue. (#37)

LITURGY LESSON: The First Reading

Today we spend a moment on just the first reading. The primary part of the Jewish synagogue service was the reading from what the Jews called Torah and *Nevi'im* (ne veem). The *Torah* is the first five books of the Hebrew Scriptures. *Torah* is the Hebrew word for *The Law. Nevi'irn* is a less well-known word that means *The Prophets*, and applies to much of the rest of the Hebrew Scriptures. We know, for instance, that when Jesus was invited to read at a synagogue service in Nazareth, he chose a reading from *Nevi'im*; on that particular occasion, the prophet Isaiah.

The earliest celebrations of the Eucharist always included a reading from the Hebrew Scriptures. Since the Second Vatican Council the Church has restored the Hebrew Scriptures to prominence because, as St. Augustine said, "In the Old Testament the New is hidden, in the New Testament the Old appears." On most of the Sundays of the year the first reading is from the Hebrew Scriptures, although on a few occasions, such as during the Easter season, it is a passage from the Christian Scriptures.

:Last Sunday's reading from the Hebrew Scriptures (Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4) spoke of how, hard times are making the prophet fearful – and how God sets Habakkuk's fear aside with a vision of hope. It was chosen because of its relation to the Gospel, which proclaimed how Jesus encourages his disciples to have hope because of their faith, even if that faith is as small as a mustard seed.

During this Holy Year, the Jubilee of Mercy, we are called to renew our relationship with God and the Church. Attempting to pick up the pieces of one's life after the tragedy of divorce is an area that can impact a person's relationship with God and the Church. One of the significant issues that a person faces is their place in the Church. Does the Church still care about me even though I am divorced? Am I allowed to go to Mass? Can I receive communion? How can the Church help me heal? If I decide to marry again, what do I have to do?

The Tribunal of the Diocese of Cleveland, especially during this Jubilee of Mercy, offers its *First Step Program* in order to help individuals deal with these questions in order to renew and/ or strengthen their relationship with God and the Church. This program is offered to help everyone, especially those who have experienced divorce, learn more about Catholic teaching regarding marriage, divorce, and remarriage. 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LITURGY LESSON: *Responsorial Psalm*

Last week we spoke about the First Reading.

Today we hear something about the Psalm Response.

Continuing the practice of the Jewish synagogue, early Christians traditionally sang a psalm after the first reading. In the early Church there was a pattern to the psalm response, much like our own today. That is to say, there was an antiphon or verse sung by all followed by extended verses of a particular psalm chosen for the day with the antiphon intervening every so often by way of a response. Many of the Fathers of the Church make mention of this format. St. Augustine makes explicit mention of the practice in his sermons; likewise, St. John Chrysostom and St. Leo the Great among others.

In the early days, the psalm texts were sung in their entirety. This was true even of the lengthier psalms. (Today, there are usually selected verses of the psalm used. It is rare that a whole psalm be sung unless it be brief in itself). The responsorial psalm was seen as an integral part of the liturgy with its own significance. This is in contrast to some of the other singing we have previously discussed such as the entrance hymn which is sung to cover a movement. In this way it existed for a purpose beyond itself. The responsorial psalm has an importance in itself and does not exist to cover motion; it is seen as a moment of pious meditation - a lyrical rejoicing after the word of God had been received. It is true to say that the Psalm is "another reading" in the sense that the psalm, like the other readings, comes from the scriptures. However, a caution is in order. The psalm should also be seen to enhance the prayer and praise that is integral to the Liturgy of the Word. Thus, it is not merely a "listening event" but also involves prayer and praise in the truest sense of the term. The psalms were (and still are) the prayer book of the Jews and it is our prayer book as well. Hence, the psalm is prayer and not only "another reading."

The title "responsorial psalm" is not given because there is a response or antiphon for the people to sing. The "response" referred to is the *reflection of the assembly* on the proclamation of the reading which just took place. The psalm is usually related in some direct way to the theme of the Hebrew scripture reading (and by that very fact to the Gospel which is to come). Thus, the people "respond" to the Word of God, make it their own and proclaim it prayerfully. By its nature, the psalm is a song and should thus be sung if at all possible; especially on Sunday.


Are we charging for the old hymnals. In short: no ... but we'd never turn down a donation, should you desire to make

In the weekly finance report in column 4, you may have noticed the line item "Designated for Parish Use Only." Why is this being listed? The diocese requires that the intention of the donor always be honored when funds are received. And because there are some who request that 100% of their donation remain at St. Patrick Parish, it's appropriate to make that distinction in our weekly report.

Why wouldn't 100% of ones donation stay at St. Patrick or directly benefit St. Patrick Parish. Well, we are part of the Diocese of Cleveland and receive many services and benefits from the Diocese (financial, legal, spiritual, PSR and educational, etc) and these services aren't provided for free. While we don't receive a direct bill for these services, we are assessed 16.5% of our regularly offertory collection. (Gratefully this is a much lower rate than the IRS assesses us for taxes, but that's another story for another day.) In any case, because we do receive services from the diocese, we do pay assessments on all offertory monies that are received without designation or restriction.

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LITURGY LESSON: Second Reading

There was a time when we only had two readings at Mass: the Epistle and the Gospel. The word *Epistle* means *Letter*, and it referred to the letters that a leader in the early Christian Church wrote to various communities. Most of these were written by St. Paul, but there are some that are letters from Peter, James, John, and Jude – and one, the *Letter to the Hebrews*, written by an anonymous writer. These Epistles, and two other New Testament books (The Book of Acts and the Book of Revelation), are now used as the Second Readings at Mass.

Today's letter is taken from St. Paul's second letter to Timothy. Second Timothy is a deeply personal letter. Paul is imprisoned in Rome for the second time (1:17). His first imprisonment apparently ended with his release (Acts 28:30). But now under the Emperor Nero, Paul is more certain of his fate. He has completed his last missionary journey and is close to execution. In the chapter of II Timothy from which we read today, Timothy is probably still in Ephesus (4:12), but Paul wants him to come to Rome to be near him in his last days (4:9). Though in prison, Paul still coordinates the movements of the missionaries under his authority (4:10-12) and he is concerned about the condition of the churches. He has been deserted by his close associates (4:10, 16) and he is combating false teachers (1:15, Paul's purpose for writing the letter is to encourage, exhort and uphold his disciple Timothy and to summon him to Rome.

These New Testament letters became so important to the various communities that selections from them began to be read every Sunday. We know that these letters were read in the churches of the early Christian communities because in the last verses of Paul's letter to the Colossians, he say's "After this letter has been read to you, have it read in the assembly in Laodicea." Now we, here in the church of St. Patrick, hear these same letters read two thousand years later. It takes us back to the First Century, to our roots as Christians.

In next weeks liturgy lesson we'll speak of the Gospel Acclamation & Procession.

I recently receive the following plea from Bp. Lennon:

The Catholic Diocese of Cleveland and dioceses across the country have been asked by the leadership of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops to hold an emergency second collection for the people and the Church impacted by Hurricane Matthew which devastated significant parts of the Southeast coast of the United States and some countries in the Caribbean, especially Haiti. Thank you for your support of this most urgent effort.


Bp. Richard Lennon

LITURGY LESSON: Gospel Procession & Alleluia

During the opening procession the Book of the Gospels was placed on the altar. The Book of the Gospels is appropriately placed there because of what the Altar and the Eucharist proclaim: the Good News of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

The movement of the Book of the Gospels, from the altar to the ambo, is normally done with musical accompaniment. During all liturgical seasons, except Lent, the procession is accompanied by sung ALLELUIA's; a Hebrew word that means "praise God."

If you attend weekday Mass, you'll notice that some acclamations (if not sung) are recited; an example of this would be the psalm response, the Holy Holy, or the Lamb of God. The Gospel acclamation is an exception to this: it is never to be recited; if it is not sung, it is omitted. The sung Alleluia is an expression of the joy with which we are to anticipate the reading of the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ. This same joy cannot be conveyed in the spoken word – so, when this acclamation is not sung, it is omitted.

At the conclusion of this procession, the priest or deacon places the Book of the Gospels on the ambo. He gives the usual greeting and then says, "A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke," to which we respond, "Glory to you, <u>Lord</u>." Notice that we address the Lord because **it is He who is speaking to us through the Gospel**.

Then the priest or deacon does something unique. Using his thumb he makes the sign of the cross on the book, and then he makes small signs of the cross on his forehead, his lips, and over his heart. If you look around you will see many in the congregation doing the same. Why? There are no words that accompany this gesture, but the traditional meaning of this triple sign of the cross is this:

May the Word of the Lord be in my mind, on my lips, and in my heart.

It has become a custom that we all make that triple sign of the cross.

The Catholic Bishops of Ohio offer the following reflection on *Making Moral Choices in Voting*; it is also available on their website at http://www.ohiocathconf.org/

In the Catholic tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue. The responsibility to make political choices rests with each person and his or her properly formed conscience.

As bishops, we do not intend to tell Catholics for whom or against whom to vote. Our purpose is to help Catholics form their consciences in accordance with God's truth". (#7 Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship)

Catholic voters are called to properly form their consciences in preparation for voting and for the continued advocacy for just laws and policies required after voting. This process should focus on moral principles, the defense of life, the needs of the weak, and the pursuit of the common good. It requires constant prayer, understanding of Church teaching, and discernment that goes beyond campaign rhetoric and partisan politics.

This discernment should focus on a candidate's consistency with moral principles, sincerity, integrity and the ability to effect the policies that he or she promotes. It should also include seeking and verifying background information regarding a candidate's stance on policy issues, and a consideration of those who would be directly impacted by such policies.

Prayer before an election:

Lord God, as the election approaches, we seek to better understand the issues and concerns that confront our city/state/country, and how the Gospel compels us to respond as faithful citizens in our community.

We ask for eyes that are free from blindness so that we might see each other as brothers and sisters, one and equal in dignity, especially those who are victims of abuse and violence, deceit and poverty.

We ask for ears that will hear the cries of children unborn and those abandoned, men and women oppressed because of race or creed, religion or gender.


We ask for minds and hearts that are open to hearing the voice of leaders who will bring us closer to your Kingdom.

We pray for discernment so that we may choose leaders who hear your Word,

live your love, and keep in the ways of your truth as they follow in the steps of Jesus and his Apostles and guide us to your Kingdom of justice and peace.

We ask this in the name of your Son Jesus Christ and through the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

FORMING CONSCIENCES FOR FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP:

A CALL TO POLITICAL RESPONSIBILITY FROM THE CATHOLIC BISHOPS OF THE UNITED STATES—PARAGRAPHS 34-37

Catholics often face difficult choices about how to vote. This is why it is so important to vote according to a well-formed conscience that perceives the proper relationship among moral goods. A Catholic cannot vote for a candidate who favors a policy promoting an intrinsically evil act, such as abortion, euthanasia, assisted suicide, deliberately subjecting workers or the poor to subhuman living conditions, redefining marriage in ways that violate its essential meaning, or racist behavior, if the voter's intent is to support that position. In such cases, a Catholic would be guilty of formal cooperation in grave evil. At the same time, a voter should not use a candidate's opposition to an intrinsic evil to justify indifference or inattentiveness to other important moral issues involving human life and dignity.

There may be times when a Catholic who rejects a candidate's unacceptable position even on policies promoting an intrinsically evil act may reasonably decide to vote for that candidate for other morally grave reasons. Voting in this way would be permissible only for truly grave moral reasons, not to advance narrow interests or partisan preferences or to ignore a fundamental moral evil.

When all candidates hold a position that promotes an intrinsically evil act, the conscientious voter faces a dilemma. The voter may decide to take the extraordinary step of not voting for any candidate or, after careful deliberation, may decide to vote for the candidate deemed less likely to advance such a morally flawed position and more likely to pursue other authentic human goods.

In making these decisions, it is essential for Catholics to be guided by a well-formed conscience that recognizes that all issues do not carry the same moral weight and that the moral obligation to oppose policies promoting intrinsically evil acts has a special claim on our consciences and our actions. These decisions should take into account a candidate's commitments, character, integrity, and ability to influence a given issue. In the end, this is a decision to be made by each Catholic guided by a conscience formed by Catholic moral teaching.

Mass Intentions. There is no better gift to give than the gift of God's love and compassion as celebrated in the Mass. Last week Fr. Reymann asked me "what's that piece of paper on the window?" I mentioned to him that five windows in the parish center don't work: the kitchen window, the main office window, the PSR office window, the dining room window, and the sliding glass door in the large first floor meeting room. I went on to say that a representative from Pella was out, and he indicated that it would cost more to attempt to fix the windows than it would to replace them.

I then mentioned to Fr. Reymann that the wood of the doorframe into the main office is rotting, and the Lincoln Street doorway suffers from dry rot on the hinged side of the frame.

The doors and windows are just one small piece of the picture of what still needs attention in the public areas of the parish center. The wall paper in the parish office, as well as the PSR office, really does need to be removed and the surfaces freshly treated.

And beyond the office areas, the PSR classrooms in the basement of the parish center need floor covering; at present they're just bare cement. When we painted those classrooms earlier this year, we determined that we'd be better off with plain cement than with the original shag carpet squares that were still somewhat adhered to the floor. Yes, we're better off with nothing than with what we had, but that just lets you know how bad the shag carpet squares were; the point is that we do need floor covering in those spaces.

With the many of the public areas of the parish center needing attention, it also makes sense that the residence area needs a bit of attention as well.

- The kitchen needs a dishwasher, and ever since my arrival at St. Patrick's only one of the five burners on the stove works. (Rest assured I'm not a gourmet cook, and one burner has suited my needs so I've not been in a rush to replace it but it does needs to go.).
- In the residence area, the carpet padding in Fr. Reymann's old room has petrified (it's supposed to have cushion, but has solidified and is brittle). And the bathroom needs an overhaul.

It's one thing to talk about the various needs — and another thing to see what those particular needs might be. So I'd like to have an "Open House" after Masses next week, so you'll have a chance to see the PSR classrooms, the office areas, the meeting spaces, the kitchen, and even the residence area.

And if next weekend doesn't work for you, feel free to stop by any time the parish office is open to peruse the basement and first floor areas (if I'm not around when you stop by, I'd prefer you not venture into the 2nd floor residence space – which is no different that you not wanting someone walking through your home without you there).

LITURGY LESSON: The Gospel

A liturgy lesson about the Gospel may not seem to be needed. We know that Gospel means "good news." We know that there are four Gospels, each written by an Evangelist, a Greek word which means "bringer of good news." We know that those evangelists were Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. We know that these men gathered the stories and sayings of Jesus and each arranged them in a book to present a particular point of view about this Man in whom they had great faith as Savior of the World.

But it is their place in the Liturgy that is important to us today. From earliest times the primacy of the Gospel has been emphasized by special signs of respect and honor surrounding its liturgical proclamation. In recent weeks we spoke about the Gospel Procession, the Alleluia, and the triple sign of the cross.

Note, also, that we stand for the Gospel. Standing in the early church was the ultimate sign of respect – such as men once did when a woman entered the room. Also, incense and candles are sometimes used to honor the Book of the Gospels. Although, you may experience incense used elsewhere ... Fr. David's asthma precludes us from using it at St. Patrick's.

Another sign of importance is that the Gospel is to be proclaimed by an ordained minister: a priest or deacon. At the end of the proclamation, the priest or deacon says, "The Gospel of the Lord," and we respond "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ." We are speaking to Jesus Christ, the Word of God, when we say that. "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ."

Finally, the priest or deacon reverences the Book with a kiss. He says quietly to himself, "May the words of the Gospel wipe away our sins." The Power of the Gospel is profound: it gives us faith and has the power to turn us from sin.



LITURGY LESSON: FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING

Today is the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year, and we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. This is not an old feast. It was only established as a celebration of the universal Church in 1925, and it was to be celebrated on the last Sunday of October.24 It remained there for almost a half century until the reforms of the Second Vatican Council.

By 1925 the Russian Revolution had occurred, which was an atheistic movement. The world had experienced the first truly World War. There was the hedonism of the post war era, the industrial revolution, and an emerging belief that science could solve every problem. Pope Pius XI decided that the world needed a symbol that would reassert that all life is to be directed to God – in this case, to Christ the King. After the Second Vatican Council, the Church felt it appropriate to transfer this feast to the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year as the capstone or summit of the year.

Next Sunday is the First Sunday of Advent, and we begin again the cycle of celebrating the Paschal Mystery of Jesus: his incarnation, birth, public life, death, resurrection, and the fulfillment of his promise to send his Spirit at Pentecost to guide the Church.

The Liturgical Year, however, is not just a neverending cycle, year after year remembering something long past. The Church always reminds us that every Sunday is the celebration of the Paschal Mystery leading to the time when, as it says in Paul's letter to the Philippians 2:10-11:

... at Jesus' name every knee must bend in the heavens, on the earth, and under the earth, and every tongue proclaim to the glory of God the Father: Jesus Christ is Lord!

ON THANKSGIVING DAY Mass will be celebrated at 9AM. What better way to celebrate a day of thanks than by spending time with the Lord who gives us each day!

If you can't pray with us on Thanksgiving Day, consider being a part of the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service tonight (Sunday 11/20)at 7:00 at the First United Methodist Church.

I've been woefully remiss in reviewing the results of the Christmas Day Mass survey that was in the bulletin in September. The first few results indicated people only attending Christmas Eve Mass with no preference for Masses on the Day.

Now that we're embarking upon Advent, I picked up the stack of responses (42 in all; respondents were invited to "check all that apply) and here are the results:

Mass Survey	Respons
I go to Mass on Christmas Eve, and have no preference for Mass time on Christmas morning	21
I go to Mass on Christmas Eve, but would go at 10AM Christmas morning (if offered)	7
I would prefer a 10AM Mass on Christmas Day morning	13
I want to keep Christmas morning Mass at 11AM	1
I like both Christmas morning Mass times, and will go with whichever others prefer	5

It seems significant that 20 indicated a desire for a 10AM Christmas morning Mass, a single respondent desiring the 11AM Mass—and five planning to attend whenever Mass is offered. Thus, it seems warranted that we adjust the Christmas Mass schedule to accommodate the majority.



LITURGY LESSON: The Season of Advent

Advent began in Fourth Century Gaul (now largely France) where Christians observed a second Lent. This "second lent" was a six-week period in anticipation of the Feast of the Epiphany, on January 6. Christianity had recently been legalized with the Edict of Constantine in 313 AD and, given this new freedom of religion, there were many adult conversions. With so many converts, individuals were not only brought into the Church on Easter ... they were also brought into the Church on Epiphany, too. These Catechumens used this "second lent" as a time of intense preparation for Baptism.

The observance of the season spread to Rome. But here it was regarded as preparation for Christmas. Pope St. Gregory the Great shortened the season to four weeks. In the prayers and readings of the Roman liturgy the season lost its penitential tone and focused on the coming (adventus) of the Lord Jesus. This became the universal meaning of Advent. Since the Ninth Century, the Church Year has commenced on the first Sunday of Advent.

Even if the liturgical color is purple, and the mood is subdued and serious, Advent is not another Lent. However, the season does not merely lead to one day, Christmas; it prepares us for the "day of the Lord." It resounds with promise, expectation, a sense of waiting in hope and patiently learning that time is in God's hands.

LITURGY LESSON: Immaculate Conception

Celebrating the conception of Mary had its origins in the church of the Eastern Mediterranean in the late 6th and early 7th centuries. The eastern theologians reasoned that Mary had to be free of all sin, both original sin and personal sin, in the light of her role in the history of salvation as the Mother of Jesus. The observance gained popularity and found its way to the Western Church more than a century later.

Western theologians, however, were hesitant to affirm that Mary was free of all sin because of the dominant influence of St. Augustine's theology of original sin. One finds that hesitance in the writings of medieval theologians like St. Bernard of Claivaux, St. Albert the Great, St. Thomas of Aquinas, and St. Bonaventure. They felt that the claim that Mary was free from all sins ran contrary to the church's understanding of original sin. John Duns, a Scottish Franciscan who taught at Oxford and Paris in the generation after Aquinas and Bonaventure, took the contrary position and his theology appealed to the popular belief of the faithful. Almost three centuries later, the Council of Trent affirmed the view that Mary was free from the original sin in virtue of her role as the Mother of Jesus. The celebration and teaching of the Immaculate Conception of Mary developed in the Western church. On December 8, 1954, Pope Pius IX made it a formal article of faith. He declared: "From the first moment of her conception, the Blessed Virgin Mary was, by the singular grace and privilege of Almighty God, and in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of Mankind, kept free from all stain of original sin."

The heart of Catholic belief in the Immaculate Conception of Mary is belief in the power of God to overcome sin.

LITURGY LESSON: The Homily

Those who were raised in pre-Vatican II times speak of the instruction after the Gospel as the "sermon;" those born after 1965 have seldom heard that same instruction referred to as anything but a "homily." What is the difference? Neither "homily" nor "sermon" appears in the three editions of the Baltimore Catechism. As a matter of fact, in explaining the Mass, the old Catechism went right from the Gospel to the Creed, never even mentioning a sermon or homily.

But there was a sermon every Sunday, and a sermon in the pre-Vatican church was usually an explanation of a doctrine or law of the Church with no reference to the scripture readings. Often the bishop sent pastors a list of sermon-topics to preach about during the year.

In the revision of the liturgy, the Church said, "There must be a homily on Sundays ... it should not be omitted without a serious reason." But what is the homily?

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, in reference to the homily, says:

The treasures of the bible are to be opened up more lavishly so that a richer fare may be provided for the faithful at the table of God's word... By means of the homily, the mysteries of the faith and the guiding principles of the Christian life are expounded from the sacred texts.

A homily, then, is usually to be based on the readings of the Mass, and the priest or deacon is to draw a lesson for us about what we believe or how we are to live what we believe. A homily may also be based on a particular celebration, such as Pentecost, All Saints Day, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, or Christmas. And it may also focus on one of the prayers or responses used at that particular Mass.

As a result of Vatican II and its instruction about the homily, we have learned much more about the Bible than ever before. It was the hope of the Church Father's who gathered for the Second Vatican Council, that such emphasis on the Word would bring us to a deeper faith!

As we get closer to the end of the calendar year, I've been inundated with information from the diocese about the importance of following IRS regulations concerning charitable donations—and clarifications of what may and may not be considered a 2016 donation. Bottom line, if it's received by the parish in 2016, it's a 2016 donation. If it's received by the parish in 2017, it must be considered a 2017 donation. The only exception: if it's postmarked 2016, but received in 2017, it may be considered a 2016 donation.

Because IRS makes the rules, we need to follow the rules if St. Patrick Parish wishes to retain its tax-exempt status ... and we do! Thanks for your understanding.

The diocese also offered the following for your consideration: In this season of giving, consider making a year-end gift to our parish in gratitude for all the blessings you have received in life. As you plan to make the most of your charitable donations in 2016, know that we gratefully accept gifts of cash and appreciated assets such as stocks or bonds. If you are 70 ½ or older, you may be able to reduce your taxable income this year and help us in our ministry with a gift made directly from your IRA to our parish. Talk to your advisors and IRA administrator for more information and to be sure that a gift is made directly from an IRA to a qualified charity such as our parish.

Today, after the 11AM Mass, we'll start decorating for Christmas. Whether you can only stay for 30 minutes, or if you'd like to make an afternoon of it, you're most welcome to join us. The more that opt to participate, the easier it is on all who join in.



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LITURGY LESSON:


While not a liturgy lesson, per se, it does pertain to the Mass—so I'll cover it herein.

To help alleviate congestion during the distribution of communion, and to perhaps afford an easier flow through the church during communion, we're changing the manner by which we approach the altar for communion—and how we return to the pews.

This change will only impact the sections of pews closest to the organ/piano; those sitting in the sections of pews nearest the entry doors will continue to approach communion as you've always done.

The difference: there will now be two lines approaching the host via the central aisle of each nave—four lines total, but only two host stations. This change will allow three aisles for you to return from communion—the two side aisles, and the center aisle.

While it may seem awkward the first few times we do it, I'd be interested in hearing if you feel it is better or worse than before.


